Celebrating a successful school year

Parents, grandparents, caregivers, friends and supporters packed the house at Omarama School's final assembly for the year.

Hanging out for the holidays the pupils had only returned from the school camp at Columba the previous Friday but happily showcased their term's work, the year's highlights and farewelled their friends for whom this was their final day at Omarama School.

Board of trustees chairperson Jemma Gloag said the school was in a "great position" thanks to the dedicated and hard working team of staff. They had a "great board" which was "keen to get stuck in"

At present, it was still tackling the Ministry of Education about its plans to change school bus routes at the start of next year but there were now "some options" on the table, Jemma said. In other highlights it had been a "great camp" and the school had made a "fabulous job" of the recent production – Dusty Tales.

Principal Alison Holden said she was proud of the pupils and their "consistent hard work" and was pleased with their academic progress.

She thanked staff for their commitment, often going above and beyond their duties, and she thanked parents for always "being there when needed".

The highlights had been the school play and pet day which had brought families and the community together, she said. As well. the end of year camp had introduced a range of activities which gave opportunities to pupils to "step outside their comfort zones". The camp could not have happened without the parent helpers "making it possible".

There were six leavers this year four of whom were year 8 pupils and moving to high school. "You will be missed, we are proud of you and we wish you every success." Looking ahead 2026 will see the introduction of the new curriculum which offered "exciting opportunities", she said.

This year's year 8 school leavers are James Mason, who goes to Twizel Area School, Liam McLeod, who goes to Cromwell College, Paige Doree, who goes to Dunstan High school, and Nicole McMurtrie who goes to Twizel Area School. As well, year 7 pupil Lleyton McLoed will move to Cromwell College and year 6 pupil Toby Gloag will go to Waihi School.

A prompt to prepare

This week a group of volunteers from the newly-formed Omarama Emergency Hub group have been hard at work copying, cutting and stapling to make a different kind of card for you to display prominently.

The group has produced and are distributing 400 fridge-magnetised 'prompt' cards to the community.

You can also print yours out here.

The cards give concise points about what and how to prepare, and what to do in a disaster with a link to where to find more information.

If you have a post box there should be a card show up shortly.

Keep it handy as your prompt to prepare.

REMEMBER

- In an emergency call 111 and ask for the service required; police, fire or ambulance.
- If asked to evacuate follow the instructions of emergency services personnel. (In a civil defence emergency, evacuation orders are activated by Civil Defence and the council.)
- Have your emergency home kit ready in case you need to shelter in place.
- Have your grab bag ready in case you must leave quickly.

As you leave, write 'Evacuated' on the back of your card and place prominently for first responders to see.

PREPARE: Major crisis events DO happen here

Your town may be isolated. Work out now what supplies you need.

Basic supplies to have at home

- Water at least 9 litres per person (for drinking and basic hygiene)
- Long-lasting food that doesn't need cooking (include babies and pets)
- Toilet paper and large plastic buckets (emergency toilets)
- A First Aid Kit and any prescription medicine back-up
- Work gloves and a properly fitted P2 or N95 face mask

Basic supplies to have in a bag in case you have to evacuate

- Torches and batteries
- · Radio wind-up or with batteries
- Cash
- Copies of important documents and photo ID
- Walking shoes, warm clothes, raincoat and hat
- A First Aid Kit and any prescription medicine back-up
- Water and snack food (include babies and pets)

These locations may become an Emergency Hub (look for the Hub flags):

Omarama School honoured the Anzacs at assembly. Young bagpiper Jack Boon, one of the intake of the Growing Future Farmers' programme took a leading role in Ōmārama's Anzac Day parade and service.

The Omarama Golf Club staged yet anther successful fundraising tournament with 12 crockpots filled to the brimming waiting for players at the 19th hole.



Ahuriri Community Catchment Group

Annual Summary - by ACCG facilitator Bridget Pringle

This past year has been a year of progress and collaboration for the Ahuriri Catchment Community Group.

Our focus remains on improving water quality, protecting biodiversity, and fostering strong farmer engagement across the catchment.

Key Highlights from 2025:

Environmental Monitoring

ACCG was one of only ten groups nationwide to receive eDNA kits through the Environmental Protection Authority's Revitalising Our Rivers project. These kits allow us to expand monitoring beyond traditional water quality parameters and better understand the unique species in our waterways. A range of other stream monitoring is also being undertaken on a regular basis by the members.

Events

We hosted a Fish Celebration Day in February, bringing together locals to learn about and celebrate the specialist fish species that call the Ahuriri catchment home, also a Stream Health Assessment training day, a two-day Wetland Workshop, and interesting talks from experts about soils, irrigation, dung beetles and resource management law.

· Workshops and Representation

ACCG was represented at the Environment Canterbury Catchment Conversations workshop in Timaru, ensuring our voice is heard in regional water management discussions.

· Water Quality

Members continue to monitor hundreds of water quality sites around the catchment informing decision making about where to target on farm efforts. *Continued over*



Understanding natural influences, changing weather patterns and how land use affects the Trophic Lake Index in the Ahuriri Arm is one of our key work streams.

· Funding and Support:

We are grateful to the (ex) Zone Committee, ECan and EOS Ecology for funding and support that helps us progress actions throughout the year. Additional support from experts and partners has enabled wetland projects, planting initiatives, water quality analysis, pest and weed control and technical advice for landowners.

Innovation and Free Services

Through Wai Connection support, members have received expert guidance in ecological science across the catchment.

Looking Ahead:

Our goals for 2026 are to achieve a coordinated approach to strengthen environmental stewardship and contribute to the long-term ecological health and cultural values of the Ahuriri catchment for future generations.
