## Devoted to family, community - Bruce leaves a lasting legacy of service

It will be difficult, if not impossible, to capture in words just a little of the unique contribution this man made to this community over the past 20-plus years, just what a gaping hole he has left, and the significant legacy he has gifted us all.

But we will try.

Bruce Edward Dyson, born September 9, 1963, passed away peacefully on the morning of Saturday, May 17 at home, surrounded by his family – after a cancer diagnosis 18 months ago.

He was husband and soulmate to Julie, loved father of Bailey, Cheyanne and Korey, adored best mate of Monty and Beam, a firm friend and mentor to many and, let's not forget, a loyal Crusaders' fan.

He was a man who held his beloved family, friends and community close through good times and bad, and he was a lot of fun.

Here are the words of his family, friends and community.

Opening the funeral service in Timaru, celebrant Wendy Lang acknowledged the huge crowd many of whom had travelled significant distances to be there, saying she doubted there was "anyone left in Ōmārama".

It was a time to "honour the life of your Bruce ... to take leave of someone who you have both loved and respected."

He was a man who had "touched many lives".

It was a time to celebrate Bruce's life, his personality, his deeds, to "stop to hear the stories, to laugh and to cry together."

"We are different because Bruce lived amongst us," she said.

Close friend Lesley Jackson read Julie's tribute.

There had been many heartfelt messages of condolences sent to the family, the common theme was what a caring person Bruce was and a much loved and respected boss, she said.

Bruce hired Julie as merchandising supervisor at Quality Bakers in Dunedin and "that is when it all began".

"We became great friends, partners in crime."

It was at the farewell do for the valley's 'Bread Man' Murray Taylor, at the Ōmārama Hotel

" - a great night and a dance to Neil Diamond's 'Forever in Blue Jeans' - our song -" that was the start of "our fairy tale love".

This was despite Julie breaking an unwritten rule and hightailing it out of town first thing next morning without paying the bill.

"I had a phone call asking me If I'd paid the bill at the pub before I left, which I hadn't.

"It was an unwritten rule, the boss never used his credit card... he had to ask for forgiveness for that one."

Bruce and Julie moved to Omarama in 2002 to take up the lease of the Oasis Café. It was where they raised their three children, made lifelong friends and had 'a shit ton of fun".

After time spent living over the café they built their home in Totara Peak Cres. "Bruce built a bar in the backyard – Church - where we had many Sunday sessions with our amazing friends."

Ten years ago, they bought the lease for the Omarama Hotel and named it Boots and Jandals Hotel – "the boots being Bruce and the Jandals, Julie".

In the past months of treatment, the chemotherapy, radiation and pills really took their toll, she said.

"The support of his children meant he could stay at home for his final journey." Julie thanked the staff for their unwavering support, the smooth running of the hotel while the family took time out, and the Haka they performed as Bruce left home for the final time.

Ms Lang read the tribute to their father written by Cheyanne, Korey and Bailey. They said how lucky they had been to have Bruce as a father and how hard it was to fit a lifetime of memories into a few words.

They recalled the perks of living over the café growing up and the great after-school

snacks, heading down to the stream with the bikes and the dogs, special overseas getaways,

Bruce worked his "arse off to spoil us". He was "so fun, loving, supportive and always ...there for us...such a great father ...helping us become who we are today."

There was the trip to Rarotonga and the extra special surprise of being told Bruce and Julie were getting married and they would all be part of the ceremony.

The couple honeymooned in Port Douglas, thereafter a favourite family holiday spot.

"As soon as we could reach the counter tops Mum and Dad started our bar tendering training. We were shown once how to pour a bourbon and coke for Mum and a rum and coke for Dad. We were expected to deliver the same quality every time...

"We have Dad to thank for our great taste in music... it led to many late-night parties and we'd quickly learnt to fall asleep.

"Most Sunday mornings we were woken by Dad blasting one of his favourite songs, 'Gutter Black', to get us out of bed."

Boots and Jandals bar manager Louisa Proctor spoke on behalf of the staff.

"He always made us feel like family. He was a humble and well-respected man. We are so grateful to be part of his team under his incredible leadership. He had a positive impact on our lives, and we are forever thankful for it.

"Brucie and I had one thing in common and that was drinking rum. I'm sure you all have had a sesh with him – I mean a drink," she said laughing.

Led by Lou, the staff then sang the waiata 'Whakaaria Mai (How Great Thou Art)'.

Ōmārama Volunteer Fire Brigade chief fire officer Jack Zorab said that there was debate about whether Bruce would have actually approved of the brigade turning out in uniform for him with fire appliances and the first response unit lined up outside. "But there was general consensus that this was our last chance to get one over on him."

Qualified fire fighter Bruce Dyson – volunteer firefighter and medical first responder – Bruce had been with the Ōmārama Fire Brigade for more than 20 years, he said. "To the very end he was never about the uniform or the medals. He would actively avoid any occasion where he had to wear them.

"As a self-employed business owner you would be forgiven for thinking he would have had to miss a lot of calls and training nights due to his other responsibilities. The opposite is true.

"According to records which only go back about halfway through his service Bruce attended over 800 incidents, just since 2011. - 800 times that Bruce dropped everything to go and help somebody else, that was Bruce in a nutshell.

"He was a guardian, someone who looked out for his family, his friends and his community.

"He was a defender, when he saw something that wasn't right, he did everything he could to fix it. No better example of this was than with the first response capability in Omarama....

"He was instrumental in fighting for that service to be returned to us."

"Without his efforts in fundraising and fighting the good fight our first response service would not be what it is today."

"Bruce resigned from the brigade earlier this year – the treatments were knocking it out of him. Two decades of service and he was still worried he wouldn't be able to do enough for others.

"We weren't able to arrange a leaving do for him before he passed. We never got the opportunity to thank Bruce for everything, to formally recognise a third of his life given in the service of others, to tell him how grateful we were to him for looking out for all of us in the brigade ... He probably wouldn't have let us say all those things anyway," Jack said.

Mate Michael Jackson spoke of the loss of his "dearest friend" of more than 20 years and the "gaping hole" he had left.

"He whispered to me when we first met that one of his middle names was 'rum'." That should have been the first clue, Mike said.

He recalled Bruce and Julie's combined 30th and 40th birthday party, a seventies night at the Oasis, helping behind the bar there, and time in the fire brigade, and then seeing them through the Oasis Café fire "which was massive for the Dysons". "It showed us what a gutsy couple these two were."

In the apartment above the café there was Bruce, Julie, Cheyanne, Bailey, Korey, two cats, Coruba's nine puppies, one budgie, a Mexican walking fish - "all this and a busy restaurant to run". He said.

There was a blow-up paddling pool on the upstairs deck, an air hockey table and earpiercing studio and the trademark nip pourers in the kitchen, "with the best music and memories ever...Boy, did we want to be close to this family".

"A strong loving couple with an incredible bond, incredible children ...what a credit to them, what an incredible legacy to leave this world with."

It had been an incredible friendship " – no questions asked, no judgment delivered... just there... giving sound advice".

Mike recalled one particular incident when a freight truck came to grief on the Lindis Pass, with "potential pollutants" spilling out posing an environmental hazard as a result, and the fire brigade called to the rescue and to bury the offending contaminants.

"Bruce, with his skills learned from the hospitality industry, identified everything to be put in the pit. He felt that any liquid that was in a sealed bottle with a cork would probably be okay and then took two trips with the fire appliance to the crash site to rescue the bottles of quality wine – Bruce became Ōmārama's conservationist of the year."

"Being at the Dyson home you always felt like part of the family, visiting the family was very straight forward, returning home was often a more difficult process," Mike said.

Bruce always looked on the bright side of life and the good side of people.

"He had this instinctive mode that he would switch to see things from all sides, incredibly wise and incredibly giving.

"Even when the shit was going down, front of mind was always his family, friends and staff - that they would be okay...

"You have forever changed our lives and no doubt our livers...we're blessed to have known you," Mike said.

Former colleague Allan Sims said he first met Bruce when they worked together at Heron's Bakery – part of the Goodman Fielder Family in Timaru in the early 90s. They were mates from then on, along with Tony Green ...helping his uncle Wayne

Ramsey on the delivery truck when he was 12 years old, then he left school and worked "pretty much every job in the factory and around the bakery" and running the bread truck to Oamaru.

Tony's dad was the boss and was impressed by Bruce's work ethic and also by the fact he didn't drink. Bruce only drank coca cola. Being a sober citizen led to him getting the job as sales manager. Then at 23 he discovered that if you added rum to coke it tasted so much nicer — "never looked back", Allan said.

He was "really successful at his job - just being himself, just being a good honest, real bloke," and on one occasion winning sales manager of the year for Goodman Fielder

The writing was on the wall for the smaller bakeries, Heron's closed and Bruce transferred to Dunedin as sales manager running a team of reps, merchandisers and delivery contractors,

He took over as distributions manager there and it was noted he spent a lot more time "up central" and "not a lot of time down in Mosgiel" he said.

"He said; 'Well you've been to both, where would you go?'

"They were wonderful days ... unlimited expense accounts."

Goodman Fielder changed from a family-run business to a corporate, run from Australia.

"So, Bruce and Julie bailed to Ōmārama and built a wonderful life there, " Allan said.

Friend of 50 years Tony Green gave a short tribute acknowledging the significance of their times together.

"You can have many, many friends, but only one best friend. We have had a run and a half," he said.

Great friend and neighbouring business owners in Ōmārama, Craig Dawson said anyone who knew Bruce "knew you were going to have a great laugh". He had given a "huge gift" and left a legacy "that lives on for ever".

Ms Lang told those gathered to take time to grieve and be there for each other. "Commit yourselves to being present for Bruce's family as they find ways to live without their Bruce.

"...you are now the representatives and ambassadors of Bruce's legacy "He gave you wonderful gifts of kindness, graciousness, strength, acceptance and love, and he showed you how to live with challenges and struggles, and how to survive.

Bruce's coffin was draped with the New Zealand flag in recognition of his service, with a painting of Coruba, Sam and Buca, loved labrador friends who had passed, leaning against its side.

The family and close friends entered the chapel to 'Free Bird' – a song by Lynyrd Skynyrd

During the photo tribute 'Gutter black', by Hello Sailor, 'Run Runaway,' by Slade, and 'Take it easy,' by Jackson Browne were played.

He was carried from the chapel to Neil Diamond's 'Forever in Blue Jeans'.

Colleagues representing his volunteer service mounted a guard of honour. His casket, accompanied by the family was escorted to the crematorium by the Ōmārama First Response unit 5633 and Ōmārama Volunteer Fire Brigade tanker 5611.

## Farewell Wingy, fly high

There are not many in this world who could say with confidence, as their life reached its end that they had "nothing left on their bucket list, absolutely nothing!".

But so said Pat (Wingy) Leopold as he spent his last days at his "hacienda" as he called it, the Strathallan Retirement Village, in Timaru, where he passed away peacefully on April 13 aged 90 years.

There was standing room only at Boots and Jandals Hotel Ōmārama – Wingy's watering hole and the heart of his many yarns – for his memorial service and community farewell to that legend of the Dunny Door Table.

His ashes were ceremoniously piped into the pub by piper and friend Bill Clarke so Wingy could 'sit' and hold court at his table for one final time.

With wife of 66 years, Doreen, at his side and surrounded by family, son-in-law Steve Reeves lead the tributes.

Wingy was father to five daughters, grandfather to four granddaughters and two grandsons, great grandfather to seven, and great, great grandfather to two. Tragedy struck the family in 2018 when Wingy and Doreen lost daughter Tania Cochrane to cancer.

Steve recounted that Wingy's great passion was 'Marion', the Marion Crane, that is. As a well-respected member of the Upper Waitaki Power project team Wingy was described as "special machine operator", of the unique equipment, one of only four brought into New Zealand to work on the massive project.

'Outside the office' his twin passions were speedway racing and flying with the Twizel Aero Club.In his younger days after gaining his pilot's licence he clocked up some 600 hours of flying. Hence the nickname.

The Twizel of the early 1970s was a wealthy, bustling construction town. The Upper Waitaki Aero Club, based at Pukaki Airfield, boasted a strong family-orientated membership with two aircraft. Wingy was at one time president of the club.

Steve recounted that in his later years Wingy's job was as Public Relations Manager at the Ōmārama Service Station – owned by Steve and wife Sharon – Wingy's daughter.

"His main role there was to greet the customers and intercept the bull shit before we actually got to the bottom of what the problems were."

He was affectionally known as the Vince Martin of Ōmārama Steve said.

He soon got wise to the "same one [tyre] you did last week", claim and began writing his name and the date inside the tyres, and from then on would respond with a definite "'No, it bloody isn't', in more colourful language." Steve said.

"He was also a respected vehicle recovery specialist".

When, as volunteer firefighters, Steve and Sharon were called out on fire calls Wingy would follow in the recovery vehicle to pick up the wrecks.

"Our trailer in the early days would only fit one vehicle on it, so he used to wait until the police had left then if the vehicle could drive, he would hop in and drive it back to Ōmārama - hazard lights on of course (if they worked)".

Wingy's daughters and grandchildren then paid tribute with Doreen filling in gaps as they recounted their many memories.

Sharon said how he had "played such a major part in all our lives".

"He was always there to offer guidance when required.

"His greatest love of all was Ōmārama and the people in it, which made him the happiest."

Sharon thanked all for their love and made special mention of Julie Grant, for her carrot cakes, Rikki Remi, for his Blue Cod fish, pilot Bryan Patterson for taking Wingy for a flight when he had the chance, Ross Kelman and Laurie Ruddenklau for bringing him whitebait and firewood, Jan and Lex Perriam for the regular mail run trips, Lindsay Purvis for his trip over the Lindis Pass in the Morgan to take his flight in the Mustang aircraft, Bruce Dyson who would be there at the drop of a hat to help or give advice if required.

"These are to name just a few people who made Dad's life such a happy one in Ōmārama.

Sharon said Wingy also had "a very special spot in his heart for two dearly loved defacto daughters" – Julie Dyson and Michelle Hancox.

"Dad adored you both and loved every minute he spent with you both."

Those of his children and grandchildren, who now live out of town, told of regular phone calls 'home' and of his constant love and support.

Close family friend Lex Perriam spoke on behalf of the Ōmārama Hotel Social Club where Wingy was king of the dart board.

Wingy began the Waitaki Valley Pool and Dart Competition in 2005 where local pub teams competed for the challenge trophy and bragging rights. The inaugural competition was one by the Hakataramea Hotel but in 2023 Boots and Jandals Top Guns, brought the cup home.


We salute you, Wingy, for a life well lived.

## Butter a golden ticket to achievements

They've done it! Butter is bringing in the gold for our girls.

Ōmārama School year seven pupil Charlotte Hales' butter fundraiser has raised the final \$4000 needed to get friend and rower Sadie Mason to the 2025 U19 World Championship Regatta in Trakai, Lithuania, in August.

The butter sales were the last push needed after an all out effort in Twizel and Ōmārama over the past two months since Sadie's selection to raise the estimated \$20K needed for her training and the trip

Charlotte had been searching for ways to complete the necessary sections of the William Pike Challenge set for year seven and eight pupils at Ōmārama School when her father Simon Hales came across the Westland Dairy fundraising page. It was a golden opportunity to help both girls reach their aims, he thought.

All up Charlotte has sold 3960 250gm blocks of butter at \$4 each with \$1 from each block sold going towards Sadie's goal.

With the timing coinciding as it did with the steep rise in butter prices the fundraiser "went crazy," mum Jennie Hales said.

It took no time at all to fill three hand-written A4 pages of orders, and all of that handwriting was "quite tiring", Charlotte said.

The news of the fundraiser spread like wildfire through social media and good old fashioned word-of-mouth.

Orders came in from across the district and further afield – Oamaru, Wanaka, Invercargill, Christchurch. With shearing ahead some saw the opportunity to buy in bulk and the biggest order was for six boxes. Orders are now closed.

The next job will be packing and distributing, and the garage is cleared in readiness for that production line.

For Charlotte, the project will help her complete the 20 hours of community service needed for the William Pike Challenge which is similar to the Duke of Edinburgh Award. Those entered must complete 20 hours of community service and 20 hours on a passion project - Charlotte says this will probably be dancing - and five outdoor activities. Recently the school group ticked off the first of these by completing an overnight bush walk to North Temple.

The overall goal of the challenge is to take pupils outside of their comfort zone with

a programme that includes discovering new skills and passions, and learning firsthand how to contribute with community service projects.

As usual the community's generosity was unbeaten with donations of great raffles, prizes and gifts. Oamaru Volunteer Fire Brigade fire fighter Gemma Patterson raised almost \$4K for Leukaemia and Blood Cancer New Zealand by tackling the Firefighter Sky Tower Challenge last month. Despite contending with an old back injury Gemma successfully finished the challenge in a time of just over 27 minutes.

The challenge was to climb the 1103 steps of Auckland's Sky Tower in full firefighting kit. Gemma was placed 875th of the 1056 who competed.

About three years ago Gemma damaged a disc in her spine playing rugby and it is this which has caused an injury prone few months leading up to the challenge.

Gemma is a member of the five-member Oamaru Volunteer Firefighting team which committed to climbing the tower in full firefighting kit.

Together the team raised \$12,781.

The total raised by Gemma was \$3995

The total raised for the cause this year was \$1,956,389.

Gemma became a firefighter little more than two years ago after attending an open day at the Ōmārama Fire Brigade.

### Ōmārama Gazette response to new privacy guidelines

Last week the New Zealand Privacy Commissioner updated guidelines about photographing and filming children and young people.

As a result there will be some minor changes to the way the Ōmārama Gazette carries out this work.

The guidelines I will be using are published here for your information, are available on request and are taken from those produced by the commission detailed in the link below.

The Ōmārama Gazette policy is to:

- \*check with the child and parent each time I take their photo that I have their consent to take and share their photograph through the Gazette channels.
- \* No names will be used in captions.

- \*People can withdraw consent at any time, including getting previously published images taken down, as long as that is feasible.



Possum control - poison warning

High Country Contracting wishes to advise that a ground-based possum control operation will be taking place to keep possum numbers under control to prevent the spread of bovine TB. This operation will be conducted as a part of the TBfree New Zealand programme.

Areas covered: The area known as South Canterbury South is situated on the western side of the Waitaki Lakes, from Maraewhenua River in the South to Omarama in the north.

#### Operation date: 10 June 2025 to 9 June 2026

Poisoning methods Feratox capsules to be placed in a peanut paste inside blue biodegradable bait bags and bait stations. Cyanide paste and hand laid sodium fluoroacetate pellets may also be used in the high country.

The public is warned to take care in these areas and not to remove carcasses or baits. Baits are dangerous to people and dogs.

## The Community Reports Omarama Police



Hi everyone,

I thought it was time for a brief catch up with what's been going on around the traps.

I have had enough to keep me occupied the last few months. Easter weekend was fairly hectic with a large number of driving complaints and crashes.

In regards to driving complaints you may not be aware that the police treat every single one seriously. If someone calls up 111 or \*555 we will attend if there is a unit available and either educate the driver or take legal action or both.

Funny story, on Good Friday I attended three vehicle crashes.

The first was a tourist vehicle that ended up on its roof in the Lindis Pass after failing to take a moderate left hand bend. It's unknown if the occupants were okay as they'd left the scene by the time police and fire arrived.

The second was a small car that was rear ended on the Twizel-Ōmārama Rd as it slowed to allow the vehicle in front to pull into a rest area.

A 4WD was following too close and shunted it across the centreline and into a farmer's paddock.

What was funny is that not long after a Kiwi bloke from Geraldine-way drove past and asked his wife, 'How does someone crash on a straight section of road?'. About 15 minutes later he went to pass a slower vehicle up near the Lindis, on a straight section of road and for some unknown reason lost control and ended up in the farmer's paddock scratching his head in bewilderment.

I've also noted some long skid marks at the intersection of Broken Hut Rd leading straight across the intersection of SH8 and continuing down the bank and into the farmer's paddock. The jerks have then driven off without reporting it. I measured the slide marks which I sent to our Serious Crash analysts. They believe that the vehicle would have been travelling in excess of 150kph.

It's believed that the vehicle is an older style green/bluey green Toyota Land Cruiser. It will be missing a front wheel arch and have a broken headlight. So, if anyone has any idea who the person was let me know please, I would love to catch up them.

Last week, I was disappointed to have to investigate a fairly serious assault involving two local men that occurred on the corner of Ōmārama Ave and Chain Hills Highway. As a result one person has been arrested and charged with assault and is due in court later this week.

On the Search and Rescue side, things have been quiet, but the team have been training hard. On top of our regular training we recently had a weekend away up the Ahuriri Valley where we went over various search techniques and stretcher management and patient care. I definitely enjoyed this as I got to be the patient and be carted through the bush by them all. They've also recently done a helicopter safety course which was also great as some of our newbies hadn't been in a chopper before.

There's been some asking me if we will be doing another SAR quiz night again, like we did last year. The short answer is, 'Yes'. I just need to work out a date that will work for everyone, watch this space.

Sadly, last month was Bruce Dyson's funeral. I met Bruce for the first time in 2011 when I first came to Ōmārama. We were at a function at the fire brigade, I saw this guy walking around with a glass the size of a bucket and couldn't believe he was drinking rum. We pretty much hit it off from there and been mates ever since. Over the years that I worked with Bruce either at car crashes or medical emergencies his calm demeanour and just get it done attitude always impressed me, but probably even more so was the fact he cared about everyone else, not just his Fenz and Sar family but anyone in the village.

A lot of my favourite memories are with Bruce 'n' Julz either at the fire station or around at their place watching Bathurst, or just because it's Sunday. Brucie, it's not going to be the same without you mate, rest easy.

That's it from me. Stay safe everyone!

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


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#### Legacy – my personal tribute to a great friend and mentor

This is a rum-free story about Bruce, especially for you, Cheyanne. :)

And it is yet another recount of a treasured friendship.

Bruce had that uncommon knack to meet you where you were, no judgement.

Not many, if any, knew we were friends. Truth be told I was probably more of a project. Trouble is my middle name.

Sometimes a chat with Bruce was a little bit like being called to the principal's office.

He would walk in the door, take a seat on the couch and own the room.

I'd say, 'You know don't you?' and he would nod slowly and in silence.

And then hear my story. And understand.

He cut through the bitchy, destructive gossip. – "I never knew that was what it was all about," he would say. But, I was never given a free pass.

I was handed out extra homework as necessary. And also the support needed to get there. He encouraged me to hear my doubts then trust my instincts – to have the confidence to be myself.

Although we are so very different, we had some significant things in common.

Among those, we both have zero tolerance for bull shit.

We both believe in standing strongly for what we believe in, and in standing beside others – only with his innate wisdom he did it so much better than I ever will.

His last chat at the end of February took an unexpected turn. It was an unexpected topic. He wanted to talk about the Gazette no longer tackling council stories.

Last year when things came to a head, he had said to me that the community had not fully realised the significance of that decision and would come to regret it.

So, the reason for the chat? That time had now come, he said. It was time to push to get the council to change their policy regarding giving information to the Gazette.

I wasn't sure, but he was insistent and said he would push for me to get the necessary support. And, as I discovered only a week or so ago, despite all he was dealing with, he did just that. Well, Brucie, if you were here, you'd know - "You know already, don't you?" - that one hasn't gone down too well so far. You also know nothing makes me dig deeper than someone telling me to back off.
