New subdivision ready for take-off

A planned new subdivision for Omarama will give a whole new meaning to the phrase 'taxi to your door'.

Scott and Dee-Ann Fitzgerald have recently been granted the consent needed to develop the subdivision of the land bounded by Chain Hills Hwy, Prohibition Rd and the Omarama Airfield.

The new subdivision will be made up of 13 one hectare-plus sections and includes the Fitzgerald's lot on which they plan to build and are in the process of developing.

Scott said there had already been keen interest shown and "a couple of sites" have been held for buyers.

"Now it is consented we can look to sell off the plan."

"Titles won't be issued for several months yet, but it allows people to lock something in."

Eight of the sites will have an option to access the airfield giving buyers potential to build a small hangar and a home, fly in and taxi to the door.

"They wouldn't be taxi-ing out directly onto the runway... rather onto the runway extension, also owned by the Omarama Airfield Company.

Part of the terms and conditions for that arrangement would be that each lot owner would get a licence to access the airfield for their own aircraft and would pay landing and the appropriate annual licencing fees, Scott said.

"It's quite unique."

It would be interesting to see if aircraft owners took up the opportunity, he said.

Regardless, the blocks opened up to uninterrupted north-west views which were unlikely to be built out.

The airfield company, which is planning its own subdivision off Nimbus Dr, had been very supportive, Scott said.

The Fitzgerald's plan to "gently advertise" the lots, and gauge interest levels. "We will be erecting some advertising signs, just so that people can see the lay of the land, and how the sites will shape up."

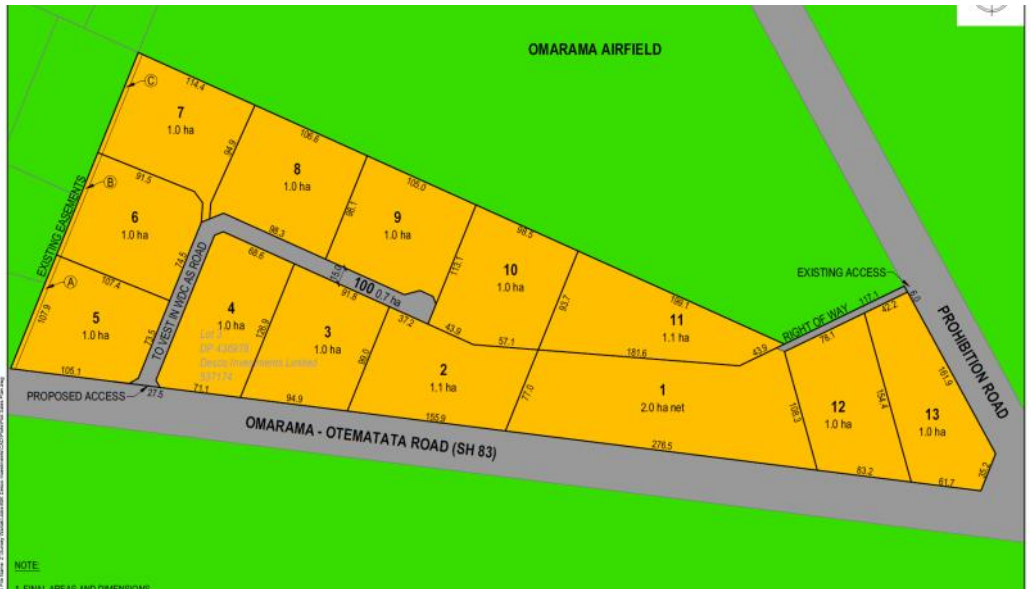
The main access to the subdivision will be from Chain Hills Hwy, similar to the Hardacre Pl entry. Four sites will have their entry via a right of way off Prohibition Rd. Tenders for the construction works – roading, servicing, close on Friday. "Then we can make a start," Scott said.

The Fitzgeralds, who lived in Oamaru, bought the block known as the Lory block in 2017 to set up a base for their cycle trail business Trail Adventures. In November 2019, the couple sold the business and moved to West Melton, near Christchurch.

Labour Weekend at Loch Laird

For the first time for many years Labour Weekend in Otematata was as it is meant to be – relaxing and enjoyable for all - visitors and residents alike.

This year measures were put in place to try to prevent a repeat of previous years when the alcohol-fuelled behaviour of young people – many under the legal drinking age - who come to the Loch Laird campground to celebrate the end of the school year, has been cause for concern.

After a year of discussions and work by a community group set up to address those concerns new measures were put in place which included a liquor ban for the weekend, and an increased police and security presence at the top terrace and in the Otematata township.

A poster was distributed which emphasised the message that young people were welcome to come and "have fun in the Otematata Sun" but the emphasis of authorities would be on reducing harm.

The council also publicised its approach through the Oamaru Mail and Otago Daily Times.

The measures appeared to have paid off.

Senior Constable Nayland Smith, of Upper Waitaki Police said it was a great success with few "unsupervised youth" turning up and those who had were well-behaved.

"Overall, it has worked with a small bit of displacement."

About 20 to 30 young people set up camp at the Boat Harbour campground and two separate groups of about 10 camped at Parsons Rock.

This is in contrast to previous years when it was estimated at least 250 and likely at times up to 300 young people would converge on the top terrace for the weekend-long party.

One 18-year-old male from Dunedin was arrested and charged with disorderly behaviour and breach of the liquor ban. He was released with a warning, Snr Const Smith said.

On Saturday night two alcohol infringement notices – fines of \$200 - were issued to two 17-year-olds for being under 18 and in possession of alcohol in a public place without adult supervision.

They said their parents, who were in Oamaru, had supplied the alcohol, Snr Const Smith said.

The message has gone out there was "zero tolerance" for rule breakers, he said. He would definitely be recommending the same alcohol ban be put in place for next year.

"This is the new norm for Labour Weekend, and we will be doing exactly the same next year and in fact every year until this tradition is no more."

Ahuriri Community Board chairperson and long-time Otematata resident Vicky Munro said it had been a Labour Weekend as it was meant to be, "with people showing social responsibility".

"The message went out the young people were welcome but there would be rules and they would be enforced.

"Matters were getting out of control and as leaders of the community we had to take a stand."

The change was the result of a “good team effort all round” – police, the council and community, Mrs Munro said.

She agreed with Snr Const Smith that efforts would need to continue for a few years yet in order to break the cycle and turn “the culture” around.

The Omarama Gazette contacted the Oamaru high schools’ counsellors to ask how pupils viewed the new measures.

Only Colin Pine, of Waitaki Boys’ High School, replied.

“I suppose the biggest changes here were that there was no fallout from the weekend.

“Firstly, the students weren’t discussing what happened in some excitement.

“They were definitely calmer as a senior group.

“And it seems from what they’re saying that the weekend passed uneventfully, which is very nice ... no drama, wonderful, no follow-ups needed.”

Mr Pine said he believed if asked individually the boys would give their support to the new measures. However, when in a group they “may give less support”.

Because the weekend proved quiet the costs of the additional council measures are expected to come in at about \$6,200.

It was Waitaki District Council recreation manager Erik van Der Spek who raised concerns with the council, and not for the first time, after Labour Weekend 2020.

“This site has become a default party scene for some high schools at Labour Weekend. [Council staff] do not encourage this behaviour and the Otematata community, other campers and council are having to handle this and attempt to manage a community/ societal issue

“In the future the [Recreation] unit will look at options such as banning glass and other operational management practices that might help,” his report at the time said.

Later in an email to the Omarama Gazette he added; “As a community we need to find a way to get parents and kids to take responsibility.

“Council, our camps and our camp manager aren’t babysitters or social workers.

“As with the police, we have limited ability to act until someone does something illegal.

“While we can implement measures such as closing areas, alcohol bans, glass bans or, this also impacts other legitimate users and is likely to just move the issue to other camps, into Otematata or elsewhere... We need parents and participants to realise that by their action or inaction in condoning this behaviour and by supplying the alcohol that fuels it, they are putting their children’s safety at risk,” he stated.

The working group held its Labour Weekend at Loch Laird 2021 debrief at a closed workshop last week.

The Omarama Gazette gives Mr van der Spek the last word.

“The consensus is that it was a great success.

“The number of issues police had to respond to were significantly less than in previous years and the local residents report this is the first Labour Weekend that they have not had mailboxes and other assets damaged.

“While planning will take place closer to next Labour Weekend, the current thinking is that we will respond very similarly to this year with a alcohol ban and an increased police presence.”

In memory of Abby

This was for you, Abby

Much of the Omarama Gazette's year-long campaign for change at the annual gathering of young people celebrating the end of school year at Loch Laird was motivated by memories of Abby.

Abby Maree Cox, a Year 12 (form 6) pupil at Waitaki Girls High School was a passenger in a car when the teenage driver lost control and slammed into a tree. They had decided to go for a drive about 11pm when the accident happened. Abby, 17, died at the scene.

This year marked 18 years since that tragedy.

It was one tragic moment but the effects that moment have rippled out through the community and through time.

Abby would have turned 35 this year.

I did not know Abby but the memory of the heartbreak of family and friends, and the recollection of a community in grief is still tangible.

This is Abby's legacy - she loved having fun, that is why she was there.

But, more than anything, she wanted her friends to be safe.

And now, her friends want their children and their children's children to have fun.

And our community wants them to be safe.

Abby is often talked about among friends who were all deeply affected by that night. Michelle Harper is one of those friends.

For many years Michelle was invited to speak to the Year 12 students of all three Oamaru high schools, speaking to pupils about the crash as a guest speaker during the "Drive to Survive" campaign.

The reason for this was to let the local young people know that this can and did happen to one in their community.

This year, on the eve of Labour Weekend Michelle wrote these thoughts on her social media pages and I asked her if I could share them. - Ruth Grundy, editor

" - driving up to Mum and Dad's today with Sharon behind the wheel, as we approached Otematata we were chatting away about the shinadigins that would be going down at the campsites, about the carefree teenagers enjoying their Labour Weekend.

Eighteen years ago, tomorrow (18 years ago!!!!) when myself and my friends were also carefree teenagers enjoying the first day of our Labour Weekend we were quickly smacked in the face with the gut wrenching reality that our bullet proof, it won't happen to us, classic carefree teenage outlook on life was about to be shattered by the news that our friend/sister/daughter/niece/granddaughter/cousin/ local young girl no longer had the chance to be a carefree teenager.

I will always reflect on the 24th of October, as that was the day that changed my life forever and so, so many other lives too.

I want to shake the generations that are now those carefree teenagers, who now seem to have no care in the world about their reckless behaviour and how quickly things change.

Not only did it affect the people who loved the person who we lost physically but it

affected everyone else involved.

The first people that came across the horror, the emergency responders, the police having to tell a mother and father their child was not coming home; parents of grieving children trying to navigate their way through their own grief and empathy for the parents of the young, bubbly, infectious girl that was a little bit of each of their own family; the regulars that were greeted at the checkout with a beaming smile, as was anyone that was lucky enough to cross her path.

Everything changed in that moment and there is nothing we can do about that, but we who are left in the ripple can ensure that we have learned that we are not bullet-proof and spare a second to ponder the possibilities of our own actions.

I have not been one to post about this each year, but it pains me to think that the way teenagers behave now on their "Labour Weekend trip" has any relation to this night. Not one person set out that night to be an asshole, fight, trash the camp-grounds, taunt the local police for entertainment like the current lot and certainly not to be in a car crash. Everyone was just out to have fun with friends and the cost for many that night was irreparable.

I am the daughter of a first responder that volunteers his time to keep your kids safe from harm, and now a Mum of a teenager.

It is my responsibility to educate my child on how to behave and I will be damned if the memory of my friend is tainted by the actions of everyone else's kids who are left to behave like assholes under a "cloud" of what happened 18 years ago. What a load of crap! Parents need to teach their children that it can happen to them, and will, if they continue to behave in such reckless manner.

If one person remembers that their mum, dad, uncle, aunty, neighbour or dog walker knew that 17-year-old Oamaru girl who tragically lost her life, if one person stops to think about the repercussions of their actions and decides not to get behind the wheel or in the car, then this is a win.

I miss my friend, I often wonder what she would be doing now with a smile on my face and a lump in my throat.

Change of faces at the helm

There were fond farewells and warm welcomes as a changing of the guard took place at last month's Residents' Association of Omarama annual meeting. Long-standing advocate for Omarama, Tony Chapman, stood down as chairperson because of a move to Russell, Northland.

Former Omarama businessman Lindsay Purvis was elected to the role.

The association formally thanked Tony for the part he has played.

He joined the committee in November 2016 after election to the Ahuriri Community Board. At the time Tony was new to Omarama – he and Amanda having purchased the Top 10 Holiday Park at the start of the year – but neither were new to the valley. His family farmed near Kurow for 155 years until the farm was sold in 2013.

Tony had been a committed supporter of Omarama and the association, RAOI treasurer Stephen Grundy told the meeting.

“As he promised at the time he went onto the board – he has been a voice for Omarama, taking on community concerns and advocating for the town and its residents locally and further afield.

“During his tenure he and the team have worked to see the sports courts through to completion and their worth to the town proven time and again.

“The library shifted to a larger brighter space, and it also has seen greater patronage.

“He is always encouraging of activities and fundraising which has seen the centre become an important hub of the community.”

He had also overseen numerous petitions and submissions to the council, most notably the long-time push to get the traffic concerns at the town centre addressed.

“Behind the scenes he has tackled the hard questions and dealt to the practicalities of small-town management – like overflowing and smelly bins. All the while juggling a very busy accommodation business,” Stephen said.

In his chairperson's report, Tony thanked the committee for their work in the past year.

Lindsay and wife Bev owned Merino Country Café and Gifts for 24 years until their retirement in September 2017.

A year later Lindsay, a former farmer, was appointed Rural Support Trust Otago co-ordinator, helping those who live and work rurally navigate whatever comes their way. Trust coordinators have defined roles in civil defence emergencies and co-ordinate government relief packages when severe weather events or other crises strike.

A decision was made at the meeting that each office bearer should have a 2IC, not only to share the load but also to help with ‘succession planning’.

To this end, Ann Patterson will continue as vice-chairman; Gary Sutherland will support Stephen Grundy, who continues as treasurer, Michelle Kitchen who is also hall curator, will support secretary Yvonne Jones.

Maurice Cowie has been elected to the committee. The remaining members were confirmed: Jemma Gloag, Hank Verheul, Trevor Mollard, Michelle Kitchen and Gary Sutherland.

The association's aims are to manage the community hall and amenities, to promote good will and a sense of community, and to provide a means by which concerns can be raised and, if necessary, addressed.

Meetings take place for “one hour once a month” at 7.30pm on the third Thursday of each month at the Omarama Community Centre.

\$1.46m water treatment plant for Omarama

The Waitaki District Council has plans to build a new \$1.46million water treatment plant for Omarama, although the planned location is being kept under wraps for now. The matter was discussed in a public-excluded session of the additional council meeting October 26, 2021. Discussion was held behind closed doors so as not to prejudice or disadvantage negotiations.

In reply to questions from the Omarama Gazette, council assets operations manager Joshua Rendell said the work was planned after receiving funding from tranche one of the Government's Three Waters reform process, last year.

From that government infrastructure stimulus package \$1.46million has been allocated to the project and this could be increased "dependant on budget performance of other projects", Mr Rendell said.

"Any additional costs associated with the projects over the available grant funding will be funded through depreciation, development contributions or a loan funded through rates."

Mr Rendell said there would not be consultation on the location of the new plant.

"The site needed to be nearby existing infrastructure (water intakes - bores) and the council worked with adjacent landowners to try to find a suitable location for the plant. "There were limited options available, and council negotiated to get the best possible outcome for the Ōmārama community. The location is an operational and logistical consideration for Council. Several sites were considered nearby the water intakes (bores). For various reasons site selection was very limited," he said.

The activity was 'permitted' under the district plan.

"The site will be well screened from view and we will engage with the [Ahuriri] Community Board on building/site aesthetics."

The email referred people to the "publicly available" Long Term Plan 2021 to 2031 to learn what other projects maybe in the pipeline for Omarama.

Plans to address footpath concerns

It appears there may be plans afoot to address at least some of the concerns over the perennial problem of the state of Omarama's footpaths.

In 2020, the Waitaki District Council's asset management team engaged WSP to complete a footpath survey of the full network of the district's footpaths using a scooter which was fitted out with smart recording including a camera.

In a report to yesterday's Assets Committee, assets operations manager Joshua Rendell said the survey revealed that the footpath network was 92% defect free, and 4% was below the 96% level of service set by Council.

As a result remedial work is to be carried out over a seven-year period but it is planned to repair any significant issues before the end of 2021, the report said.

In an email in response to questions from the Ōmārama Gazette, Mr Rendell said the survey revealed that in Ōmārama 97.4% of the length of the footpaths did not show faults.

"[However] there were faults observed in 2.6% of the length of Ōmārama footpaths, of these faults 32% were rated very poor, 26% Poor and 42% Fair.

"Of the repairs being programmed [through the district], 19 are in Ōmārama.

"The most significant faults were potholes which are programmed for an early response as soon as practical," Mr Rendell said.

Upper Waitaki Police News



Hi everyone,

Well that's another Labour weekend done 'n' dusted.

As most of you are likely aware, a working group was formed prior to this. That group consisted of council, local community members as well as Police. This resulted in the implementation of a temporary liquor ban, better security and lighting at Loch Laird camp site and key messaging ensuring the message got out to the target audience prior to Labour weekend.

As a result, hardly any unsupervised youth turned up, those that did were mainly well behaved. In all, I arrested one 18 year old for Breaching the Liquor ban and Disorderly behaviour on the Friday night, and issued two \$200 Alcohol infringement notices to two 17-year-olds on the Saturday for being under 18 and possessing alcohol in a public place without a parent or guardian. These two youngies informed me that their parents, who were still in Oamaru, had brought them the alcohol which, if true, is a little disappointing.

It was great to hear from Ote locals that there was a different feel (better) about the town. This is the new norm for Labour weekend and we will be doing exactly the same next year and in fact every year until this tradition is no more.

I must reiterate we don't want the youngies not to come and enjoy the lakes, we just don't want them to come and behave in an antisocial manner.

Apart from that I have very little else to report. I did attend the fatal plane crash in which Bo Nilsson passed away. The CAA are the lead agency in this and will be investigating the cause of the crash. Hopefully, they can get to the bottom of it. Once again, I was impressed with the professionalism of our volunteers from both FENZ and St John Ambulance.

We are lucky to have such a great service for such a small community.

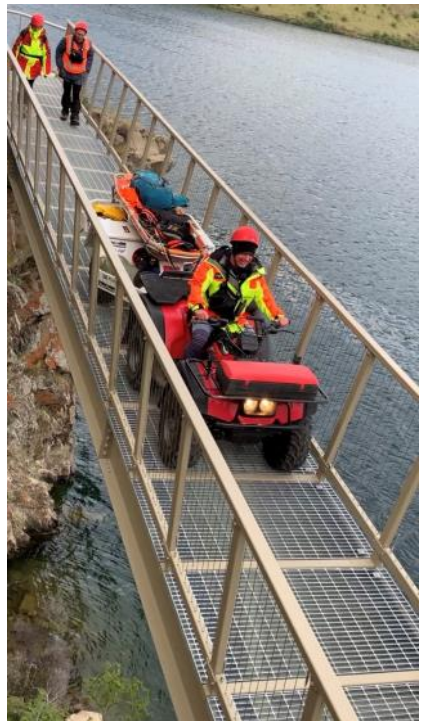

Keep safe everyone.

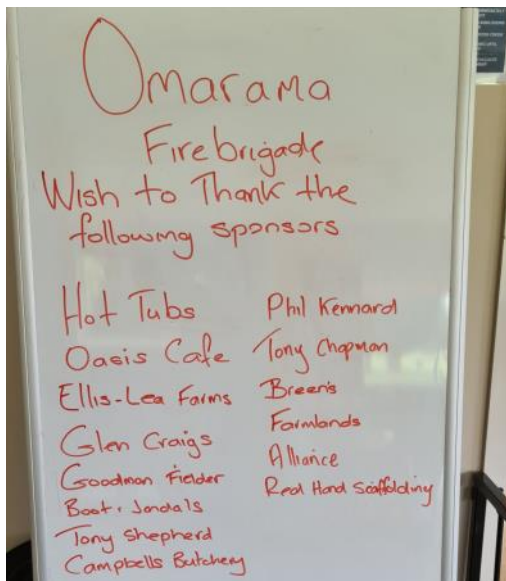

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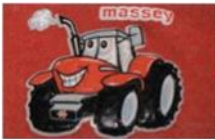

Plan to improve Twizel River picks up pace

A proposal to restore native habitat and create visitor appeal at a section of Twizel River is gaining momentum.

Twizel River is home to both native and introduced fish, plants and birds, and flows through Lake Poaka and its wetlands.

Restoration of a section of the waterway close to the town is a key priority for the Upper Waitaki Water Zone Committee and initial discussions are underway to explore the next steps in planning the project.

Additional native planting could boost native fish species and mahinga kai natural resource gathering. Over summer, the water quality is already monitored weekly for swimming and recreation.

Supporting projects that protect and enhance biodiversity is important to the Upper Waitaki Water Zone Committee.

Back in the day - Wireless Connections

We're running a series to share a little of the whakapapa of our place.

Various snippets by different contributors will recount stories of 'back in my day'.

This month: Sounds of the 80s, 90s and those 00s - as told by Stephen Grundy

Long before we had wireless there was the wireless.

When I first moved to Omarama in the mid 80s there was one TV channel and no local radio reception.

I was surprised when visiting other houses that there was often a radio going but the sound from it was mostly static.

If you had a good old-fashioned AM radio, the ones with the pre-printed dials with station names like 3YA, 4YA, 3ZB, etc, when you looked in the back you would see glass valves with a faint glow, and the radio usually made a hum noise, that way you knew it was on as it took a minute too warm up before the sound worked.

With a good valve radio you could receive a few distant stations but only during certain times of the day.

I was always interested in radio. It was fascinating to me that speech and music could be sent long distances with no wires, just flying through the airwave unseen.

My parents bought my brothers crystal set radios that worked and didn't need batteries. I think that is when my interest began.

When I was old enough my parents bought me a one transistor kitset radio, which I put together and eventually got it working.

In 1980, after leaving school and training I began work as an engineering and radio technician for the New Zealand Electricity Department in Twizel and the opportunity arose to provide an alternative to scratchy radio reception, at low cost.

Christchurch began FM transmission in stereo with enough power that the signal could be received in a few locations near Omarama, such that the installation of a radio repeater station was viable.

So, with a few spare parts from then new Electricity Corporation, a set of batteries from the closed Dunedin NZED office's phone system, permission from landowners, permission from ZMFM, a radio licence, and a lot of time, we had something up and working - 97.3 FM, rebroadcasting CHCH ZMFM program.

Credit to Tony Atkinson, my boss at the time, who did most of the coordination, and supported the project.

So now we could listen to the dulcet tones and broadcasted jokes and pranks of "James and Ken, the Moron Men", James Daniels (Stacey's dad) and Ken Ellis ZMFM's breakfast radio hosts, beaming into Omarama homes. The music may not have been everyone's cup of tea, but we actually got 80's music in the 80's.

One of the jokes about another radio station was that you could listen to the latest hits of three months ago.

Of course, our homemade radio repeater station sitting on Quailburn Hill suffered in the wind, rain, lightning, and sometimes lack of sun on the solar panel.

Rabbits gnawed their way through anything, and cattle found the solar panels were irresistible as back scratchers. And once they fell to the ground it was difficult to avoid trampling them... not a cheap fix.

It was up to volunteers to make the 4WD trip and maintain and service the site and

equipment.

In the earlier years on Quailburn Hill the aerial pole acted as a lightning rod, and lightning strikes frequently, as still happens, cuts transmission. Once a lightning strike neatly switched radios stations from ZMFM to National Radio which the younger audience saw as a conspiracy and the older audience took as an act of God! Once the town listened to the sky preview channel for a few weeks before repairs could take place.

Eventually along came PortFM.

The privately-owned Port FM network was based in Timaru and broadcast throughout South Canterbury and the Mackenzie Country.

That posed a few issues. Competition was intense and that hasn't changed, licensing laws were strict and licences costly.

The choice was to shut down the Omarama 97.3 transmission or switch to another radio station.

Someone made the decision to transmit National Radio – now called RNZ National - and with support from Radio New Zealand, it was the best option.

RNZ provided the satellite receiver to get the radio programme to our site and the Omarama community provided a new transmitter and held the licence under the name of the Omarama Residents' Association.

More recently, a deal has been struck with Network Waitaki to use their hut on the nearby Cloud Hill. This means the equipment can be connected to 230V power doing away with the need for solar panels and batteries.

And it provides just a little more protection from high country storms.

I just wish the electronics were more reliable.

For a town with a population of less than 400, we are now spoilt with four local 'old-fashioned wireless' radio stations, no internet required.
