# Good taste is in their genes

When it comes to good taste, it has to be in their genes. And father and daughter gardeners, Dave (Pop) and Heather Smith, also share that same easy and generous smile.

There can considerable challenges to gardening in Ōmārama, especially to growing a veggie garden. But both Heather and Dave, together with partners Jill Crawford-Ferguson and Shona Smith, have not only met the challenges and coaxed a generous bounty of both flowers and vegetables out of their town gardens, they also have great tips for others facing similar hurdles. And for this collaborating whanau sharing comes as easy as those smiles.

Dave and Shona have been in their present home for the past 25 years but have lived in the town for 48 and 49 years respectively.

The property had been a rental and was virtually bare ground when they moved in. They worked together on the landscaping, moving in plenty of topsoil to begin to build up the stony, river silt soils.

Dave is a from a farming background and also from the generation where growing a substantial vegetable garden was part and parcel of putting a meal on the family dining table.

Now in early spring the raised veggie patch is already weed free, the seed sown into the newly warmed soil waiting to burst into crops of greens and carrots, beetroot, potatoes and parsnips "to get us through the winter". Tomatoes and other tender plants are waiting safely under frost shelter for their turn in the sun.

The veggie garden is built on four ton of pig manure and bales of meadowhay – replenished each season with blood and bone and sheep manure. Recently, bringing in mushroom compost has been a boost for the whole garden.

Strawberries – Pop's speciality - are flourishing in the spring-time warmth in more raised beds along the retaining wall. They're already frothy with white blooms - and already covered in netting to thwart greedy birds.

Raised beds improved drainage and the warmth of the soil.

Dave digs the beds over when necessary because the silty soil base becomes easily compacted.

But he is mindful there is more knowledge nowadays about how digging can interfere with natural processes.

That's one thing about gardeners, they're lifelong learners, always ready to try something new.

Heather reckons gardening must be in her genes.

Not only Dave but both her Nana's - especially Nana Smith - were great gardeners.

Dave and Heather feed knowledge back and forth, and up and down the family tree.

Thanks to Heather kohlrabi - a low, stout relation of cabbage, with the appearance of a turnip - is now a staple crop in Dave's garden as is golden beetroot – Dave loves his beetroot.

Dave and Shona's flower garden boasts roses, lilies, trillium, hostas and peony roses; irises are blooming at the gate and pansies at the doorstep. Weeping Japanese maples grace sheltered corners with a lacey and delicate air.

But Shona's daphne has been knocked back by this year's snowstorm.

Heather and Jill's garden is comparatively new.

They began developing, what was also a relatively bare section, only four years ago.

Now deep 'doonas' of peastraw and mushroom compost are thickly embroidered with lush green foliage, and, like Shona and Dave's garden, scattered with eye-catching sculptures.

"We've always had a garden," Heather says.

Coming to Ōmārama from Australia, this the smallest garden the couple have built.

Consequently, there is no separate vegetable garden.

"We feed out of Dad and Shona's garden."

Nonetheless, in traditional cottage garden style, vegetables and herbs are popped in and thrive among the flowers and in pots on the sunny deck. And fruit trees now ring the property instead of pine trees, each marking the resting place of a beloved pet.

Heather and Jill have built the garden from the ground up – following less backbreaking no-dig garden principles and letting "worms do the work". And they revel in the fact water is more plentiful and free here unlike water use in Australia.

Both Heather and Dave recommend looking after plant health to keep the bugs at bay; though the damage caused by cabbage white caterpillars has deterred Dave from ever again growing cabbages.

The dominant nuisance in Heather and Jill's garden are a tribe of noisy blackbirds which have quite bossily insisted on squatters rights.

Despite two burly feline security guards on the premises and every other legal attempt used to evict them the birds are happily raising more progeny to double the population.

Dave and Shona, Heather and Jill all agree on one thing.

The ultimate reward for all the effort that goes into a veggie garden is the harvest and "eating it".

They try to use everything they produce – they have plenty to share and freeze and to process into something more.

Shona makes the mint sauce, Jill makes a "beautiful sauce" for meats from the leaves of the golden beetroot.

They also agree there's something more than just a family connection that pulls people into gardening.

"If you want a healthy lifestyle, out in the sun, in the outdoors, how can you not be a gardener.

"You never see an unhappy gardener," Jill says.

Coming soon:

Heather was involved in setting up community gardens when she lived in Australia.

Now, she and Jill are bringing their skills to our backyard.

Work is progressing to set up a community garden at the Community Centre – a project Heather is leading. We will keep you posted.

### Process begins to 'dispose' of St Thomas's

At this year's AGM the future of the parish and its assets were discussed, and this motion was agreed to;

"That with a sad heart, the St Thomas's Management Committee move that the St Thomas's Church, Ōmārama, be dissolved and the property be dispersed with the appropriate processes being followed, and the agreement of the partner churches."

This decision has now been shared with our partner churches, and with the community.

As the church has not been the home of a worshipping congregation for some years now, it has become a sad, but realistic eventuality.

Over the years we recognize people have put a huge effort into keeping the church going, and we thank them for their faithfulness and endeavour.

Back in February 2017 representatives of Kurow Church met with the partner churches named in the St Thomas's Joint Use Agreement, 2011 to advise that the vestry of St Thomas's could no longer continue, and the management of the church was handed back into the care of a management committee formed at that time to administer the parish and its assets.

For the past five years the Church building has been leased out and rental income split between continued maintenance and ministry in the area as needed, and donations to community groups; school, search and rescue, fire service, and latterly the funding of Covid support and food parcels during the pandemic.

However, in spite of the Presbyterian and Anglican minister's best endeavours in visiting and taking services, initiating fellowship meetings, etc we could not turn around the fortunes of the parish.

During this time we have consulted widely on the future with the community, but in spite of regular visiting in the area, fellowship invitations and trying to maintain contact we were not able to garner sufficient support for a parish fellowship.

The primary function for church buildings is to provide a place of worship and gathering for the people of God in a community, and when they cannot do that, hard decisions have to be made.

While details have not been worked out at this stage I have written to you to share this decision.

### **Campers dig deep for defibrillator**

Going to the lakes camping to "get away from it all" will now be just that little bit safer thanks to an initiative of the 'regulars' at Sailors Cutting.

Between 70 and 100 campers at Sailors Cutting at Labour Weekend joined forces to raise funds to buy an automated external defibrillator (AED) to be stationed at the campsite.

"Instigator" Ross Butterick said the group thought it was essential an AED be installed at the campground because, there was an "older population" of campers and Sailors Cutting was about 15 minutes from help from either the Ōmārama or Otematata first response units.

As well, there were more cycling through the area, he said.

"It's an important thing for us to do ...a no brainer".

Ōmārama Volunteer Fire Brigade Chief Fire Officer Greg Harper was guest speaker at the fundraiser where campers set up a raffles table and provided some entertainment for the afternoon.

There were "a good number of people" who came along to listen and ask questions about how to use an AED and what benefit it would be to have one at the camp, Greg said.

He commended them on their initiative and starting the process to have an AED on site and the team of organisers for the "great job" they had done for their camping community.

The group was well on the way to raising all the funds needed thanks to the generosity of the campers and businesses and the contribution from volunteers who "were terrific", Ross said.

The AED has been bought and will arrive any day with the hope it will be installed by mid-November

Ross hopes once this project is complete the campers may be able to buy more equipment to add to the emergency kit.

It's disappointing news, but we're old hands at this and we know what to do. We know it's a sneaky one and so there's a danger of infecting others before you know you've got it.


By doing the basics - wearing a mask, keeping our distance, washing hands - we can help care for those around us whose immune systems are not quite up to it.

### Care in the community - this could help

This past year and its events - plague, snow, floods - has taught us much. Significantly, it has highlighted the lack of services available in Ōmārama which would be ordinarily available and within walking distance if you lived in town. \*\*\* We are extraordinarily blessed to live in the community we do. We look out for each other and step up to meet the need.

However, some of us have been working in the background to find out more about what is available and to encourage more outside agencies to consider isolated rural towns of the district in their planning and activities.

This is still a work in progress but here's what we know;

### If you need any of these services this is what the Twizel Community Care Centre offers:

• Work and Income – assistance with applying for benefits, helping with queries regarding superannuation, and any other financial assistance you may receive. Printing and scanning of documents.

• Inland Revenue – queries regarding anything IRD related, access to forms

• Twizel-Tekapo Community Car bookings – this is a community car that picks you up from your house and takes you wherever you need to go such as town here in Twizel or Timaru for an appointment, whatever you need. There is a cost involved depending on destinations.

• Home Delivered Meals – We have small roasts for \$10, Regular meals for \$8 and small snack meals for \$4. We can deliver to your home.

- Printing/scanning services
- Assistance with finding jobs in the area.
- Foodbank donations, and supply people with food parcels when in need
- Any other government services ACC, Department of Corrections, etc.
- Arowhenua Health Clinic Free health clinic on the first Wednesday of each month.
- Computer/cellphone assistance needing help with something on your computer or cellphone
- Rat tests/Mask supply free of charge
- · Assistance with filling in any forms or paperwork.
- Offer room hire to community groups and businesses.

Driven by volunteers, the car can be booked and used by anyone in Omarama to get you to nearby towns or cities for medical appointments or shopping visits – e.g to Twizel and back or Kurow and includes trips to Oamaru, Dunedin or Christchurch etc.

There is a minimal charge depending on the destination.

### Another organisation that does offer some limited help up our way is Age Concern (for people 65 and older).

Kathryn Bennett is the coordinator for Age Concern Waitaki, based in Oamaru. From February 14 she will run monthly coffee afternoons at the Omarama Community Centre.

She plans to bring guest speakers to these session. Topics for the first session are how to deal with elder abuse and setting up enduring powers of attorney. Age Concern has agreed to help with funding to develop the community garden and has previously helped fund equipment for the weekly winter housie sessions.

### **Ōmārama Community Co-Response Trust**

The Omarama and Districts Community Co-Response Trust held its annual meeting at the Ōmārama Fire Station last month.

This year's committee is Lindsay Purvis (chairperson), Ken Rogers (secretary), Lynley Pryde (treasurer), Liz Komen, Craig Dawson, Bruce Dyson, Greg Harper and Georgie Robertson.

The chairperson's report is below.

Hi All,

- a short update from the Ōmārama Co-Response Trust.

Again, thankyou, to all of you who turned out for our very successful public forum. The outcome of that was an email from St John indicating that they had reinstated our trial enhancement to the Memorandum Of Understanding between St John and FENZ to enable us to attend all calls .

The key word in this statement was "trial", so the work continues to have this formalised officially so that we don't have to go through this again.

Since then we have had the AGM of our trust and I was elected Chair. We felt that by having someone who was in no way connected with FENZ it would give us more autonomy when fighting for the changes that we are seeking to the MOU.

The petition is still in circulation and it is our intention to present this to Parliament in February.

This will give us more time for negotiations if needed before the MOU is revised next November.

With this in mind we have set up a zoom conference with the 14 other trusts in the lower South Island who made a sub-mission in 2021 seeking the change that Ōmārama has had in the past.

Hopefully, from this we can gain their support to add submissions to our petition and push for an "opt in/opt out " clause added to future MOU's to enable Fire Brigade Co and First Response of other small rural communities to make the choice that best suits their needs.

We are meeting regularly to discuss other ideas to gain support from these small rural communities throughout New Zealand to help them have the medical support formalised along with us and to assist us in this 'David and Goliath' battle.
