## After 10 years ECan land disposal presses on

Addressing the 'disposal' of the former Rabbit Board land in Omarama appears to have taken another small step forward in its glacial progress towards resolution.

Last week the Omarama Gazette was told Environment Canterbury representatives were in town to assess the remaining block of land ahead of a decision.

In an email in answer to questions ECan Corporate and Public Transport Services director Giles Souhwell said the disposal/sale process of the Omarama land parcels with the Crown remained ongoing.

"Environment Canterbury staff were on-site to perform a routine property inspection and to assess what is required to appropriately define the legal boundary, which must be completed for the process to proceed," Mr Southwell said.

The Gazette also contacted the Waitaki District Council to ask if there had been any progress regarding the acquisition or otherwise by the council of this land.

This was the same question put to it in August.

There had been no reply from the council staff concerned prior to going to print.

If it is not forthcoming the Gazette plans to ask for the information under an official information request. Any updates will be published next month.

Last year, the matter was raised with former mayor Gary Kircher at a public meeting in February and in April last year Mr Kitcher said he had raised the issue with Ngai Tahu who had first right of refusal to the land at the same time confirming Te Runanga o Waihao had bought part of the block.

Also last year Fenz Omarama Fire Brigade was granted title for a small section of the land which runs alongside the station to be set aside for fire and emergency purposes under the Public Works Act 1981.

The remaining block in the centre of Omarama land continues to be held by ECan.

In August, the Ōmārama Gazette also asked if the Waihao Rūnanga had considered buying the remainder of the land.

At the time Te Rūnanga o Waihao chairperson Dardanelle McLean-Smith said she understood a master plan for Ōmārama had been developed with the community, and Waitaki District Council had "clear plans for the site next to our property".

"We have not made a decision on this as it remains with the current landowner," Ms McLean-Smith said.

The community was informed by ECan in 2016 that it had moved to begin the Crown Disposal process of the land.

In March 2018 ECan's Miles McConway told the Omarama Gazette it had applied to the Department of Conservation to dispose of the reserve land as it was surplus to requirements.

"Linz (Land Information New Zealand) completes the disposal/sale of the land (through an accredited agent) and this is the part of the process that this particular piece of land is in at the moment. A LINZ accredited supplier has been appointed to ensure all is in order for the sale and they are working through this."

Last week, the Omarama Gazette has also asked Linz what progress has been made in the disposal process and received no reply before publication.

#### Background

The Ōmārama Rabbit Board land, which was originally part of Ōmārama Station, was passed to ECan in the late 1980s when Rabbit Boards were dissolved and it took over rabbit control management and the land the Board owned.

The whole parcel of land which extends west to the Ōmārama Fire Station was Crown-owned [Linz] Land – a reserve administered by the Department of Conservation and at present maintained by ECan on Doc's behalf.

The disposal process involves first offering the land to iwi which has right of refusal before it can be offered on the open market.

### Weather stories dominate October

It would not be overstating it to say the weather dominated the news, last month.

Screens were a sea of red and orange across the month as a succession of weather warnings preceded the fronts moving across country.

Wind, rain and snow, we had it all. And the rivers rose.

While we did escape the worst of it, we did have our wee dramas.

There were six days where wind gusts were recorded at more than 50km/h. The strongest wind gust was 68.1 km/h on Thursday, October 23.

The Omarama Gazette weather station recorded 175.5mm of rain for the month, the highest since the floods of July 2022 when 204 mm was recorded.

October 23 was also when the Ahuriri River reached 356.24 cubic metres a second at the SH8 Bridge making the leap from around 60 cumecs within hours.

And for those on 2degrees the internet went out that Thursday.

In what seemed a curious turn of events Emergency Management and Recovery Minister Mark Mitchell declared a state of emergency for the whole of the Canterbury region which included Omarama and other upper Waitaki communities at 6pm on Wednesday, October 22, a day ahead of the forecast conditions.

Canterbury Civil Defence and Emergency Management Group Controller James Thompson said after discussion with emergency services and the council chief executives the decision was made to declare and because of the election and, with no mayors sworn, in Mr Mitchell was asked to make the call because of the forecast conditions.

Emergency Management Waitaki was stood up for the duration standing down around 3.30pm on the Thursday, coincidently just prior to the Ahuriri River reaching its peak flow.

Five days later thick snow covered the landscape, breaking branches and felling trees.

Inevitably there were road closures leaving motorists stranded and on October 28 roads into Omarama were closed in all directions.

The rain caused washouts on Lake Ohau Rd, Qualiburn, Henburn, Shortcut and Birchwood roads.

The snow event did not trigger an emergency warning.



## Glider Café off to flying start

The café lease at the airfield recently changed hands and has reopened to enthusiastic acclaim. Barista lona Fergus has been kept busy serving a steady stream of customers headed to the counter ready to savour the offerings of the day.

The carte du jour includes all-time favourites like seafood chowder, pumpkin soup, Thai chicken curry, lamb's fry with bacon, and homemade venison pies.

The cabinet houses fresh sandwiches -not to forget cheese rolls - along with Julie's famous home-baking; goodies, slices and cakes, and there are plenty of gluten friendly options.

There is a choice of indoor or outdoor dining.

The Café is set on an extensive lawn among trees and faces onto the airfield. Pilots often taxi in to relax and 'refuel'.

The views to the Omarama mountains are magnificent and on gliding days it is the perfect place to watch launches, or the elegant sailplanes quietly return at sunset after a days' soaring.

Indoors, artwork by local artists Lesley Jackson and Kathy Kerr features on the Café walls and in pride of place is a landscape by the late Kevyn Webb.

Manager Jennie Hales said the café was open now for Christmas bookings. They also hope to open shortly on Fridays and Saturdays for evening dining as bookings dictate.

## Made with love to mark 50 years

In the high country we bake and cook to mark each new birth, or the end of a life, and every excuse in between – for a bit of a do, to take a plate or just so we can sneak "a little 'smackerel' of something".

We fill the tins.

We take time for tea and a biscuit with a snippet of gossip, we have something on hand for morning smoko, lunch boxes and an after-school treat to fill those boisterous hollow legs which race through the door to a toasty warm kitchen bursting with fragrances of vanilla, ginger, cinnamon and chocolate...or cheese and bacon goodness.

It is with this heritage in mind Omarama Playgroup has put together a cook book - 'A Taste of Country Childhood' – filled with recipes "from hearty farm casseroles to delectable desserts" to mark its golden anniversary.

As it says in the forward, for 50 years the Playgroup has been a "cornerstone of our community, a place where families connect, children blossom, and delicious memories are made".

"Within these pages, you'll find cherished recipes passed down through generations, alongside exciting new creations ... Each dish tells a story, reflecting the rural heartland we call home. These recipes capture the essence of our community spirit."

This book, produced with love, by playgroup volunteers is 156 quality pages of recipes tips and photographs of childhood and home, set in our own landscapes, lakes and mountains. "Little hands, big adventures wide open skies."

There are the old favourites like Anzac biscuits, sugar buns and cinnamon oysters, and savoury fare from picnic pie to pizza and generous puds.

There are recipes for brownie and focaccia reflecting the confluence as newer generations join and move through these early years.

Scattered through are useful tips like repurposing botched baking, starting a veggie garden, how to bone out a front shoulder and setting the table... and table etiquette.

Remember licking the bowl before washing-up. Remember when your hand was slapped back because `that' was for the visitors. Two pieces only for you – one plain, one iced.

The book moves through a roll call of Omarama families and stations who have offered legendary high country hospitality through the years.

There is the recipe for the Patterson family's (Longslip Station) chocolate eclairs which have arguably been a community favourite for decades, there is Bog Roy Station's carrot cake and those cinnamon oysters. No-one ever made them quite like Nana.

There are the well-known comforting 'cures' for "mustering, feeding out, breakfencing in the cold."

There are venison and duck recipes for the hunter-gatherers and smokos for the wool shed

This book is so much more than a catalogue of recipes but a treasury which has captured our heritage and spirit of community. It closes with this tribute; "The saying "it takes a village to raise a child" rings especially true in places like Omarama and the surrounding districts. The kindness, support, and resilience of these communities are nothing short of extraordinary."

## Below is an excerpt from 'A Taste of Country Childhood.' about the history of Playgroup.

Omarama Playgroup began fifty years ago at a small house located down Broken Hut Road.

A small group of mothers and children were meeting up and swapping books and toys weekly.

As the attendance grew, so did the need for a larger playroom, initiating the move of the group into the community hall on Chain Hills Highway.

As the group had no funds, the hall committee was approached, asking for use of the building at minimal charge.

This went down like a "lead balloon" at their AGM, however, the outcome saw a mother joining the hall committee and eventually a discounted rate was achieved by way of a cleaning service.

Initially everyone would take a book and toy along to playgroup but as the group gained more children, fundraising commenced.

Playgroup weekly meetings became a highlight for both mothers and children as they welcomed the contact with others as much as the kids did. For some it was the only time they left the farm!

One mother at Tara Hills was a school-teacher and a great asset to this small group.

The Omarama Rabbit Board had many families in those days and these kids got to play with farm kids before going to school.

New families were arriving as construction on the canals and dams at Twizel started and contractors were taking up any houses available.

Playgroup was making starting school easier for them all.

Fundraising began with the usual raffles, baking, etc. Catering in the hall for the annual stock sales was a must. Stock agents, farmers and buyers all called in for their lunch and smokos.

One bright fundraising idea was to buy "one-year- old" laying hens from a Waitaki poultry farm to on sell as "chickens" for the table.

After gathering numerous orders for them a trailer load was collected.

A group of willing mums gathered at the Longslip cookshop for the day armed with kids, food, refreshments, etc. The copper was boiled and a chain gang formed – financial goals achieved! It was a shame that the final product was extremely chewy!!

Eventually subsidies for pre-schooling became available which allowed equipment to be bought.

From those early beginnings it is wonderful to now see the purpose-built playgroup room added to the Omarama Hall, and the children and mums making full use of the opportunities now available to educate their children.

## Demonstration plot off to great start

A demonstration plot of native plants beside the Omarama Stream has had a great start with the help of the spring rains.

Earlier this year, kaimahi (the employees) of Temuka-based Arowhenua Native Nursery and Restoration planted the Golf Club Rd verge by the Omarama Stream with a selection of locally-sourced native species as a demonstration plot showcasing their work.

The wholesale native nursery and restoration business is a Māori-led enterprise dedicated to recloaking the whenua (land) with locally-sourced native species.

After receiving Jobs for Nature funding to set up the business, in just four years it has grown into a leading provider of eco-sourced native plants and restoration services.

General manager Felicity McMillan (Kāi Tahu) said Environment Canterbury's Upper Waitaki Water Zone Committee approached the nursery to plant a demonstration plot by the Omarama Stream.

It was commonly held belief native plants did not thrive in the area, she said.

"We wanted to show what natives do survive."

The nursery collects seed for all its plants from within the Arowhenua rohe (region), from the Waitaki Awa (river) to the Rakaia Awa, stretching west to Kā Tiritiri o te Moana (The Southern Alps)

The Omarama plot and plantings in Twizel would be the furthest inland the business has ventured, Ms McMillan said. The plants were low-growing, a mix of grasses, shrubs and small trees and chosen for their ability to withstand mountainous, dryland conditions. Generally, this meant they were not usually described as "pretty plants", she said. "It was all about the 'right plant in the right place'."

The plot includes Tauhinu or Cottonwood, Houhere or Lacebark with small white flowers, Kowhai, matagouri, mountain flax, Mingmingi or needle leaved mountain coprosma, snow and red tussock and Taramea or golden Spaniard.

As part of the supply agreement the kaimahi will make annual site visits in autumn and spring to check on the plants and carry out maintenance.

Ms McMillan said the nursery was "very grateful for the funding and the opportunity". www.arowhenuanativenursery.co.nz



### Possum control to ramp up in TB fight

Last month, disease eradication agency Ospri introduced a new Otago movement control area to boost its possum-control operation, as it attempts to eradicate bovine tuberculosis.

There are 16 infected herds across New Zealand including five herds in Otago which no longer includes an Omarama herd.

The new MCA includes Tarras, Lindis Valley, the upper Manuherekia and the top end of Ida Valley. About 110 farms and lifestyle blocks with deer or cattle are included.

Being in an MCA means all cattle and deer over three months old must be TB tested within 60 days of being moved off a property, and only animals going straight to slaughter do not need testing.

Manuherikia, the Lindis, and Omarama are considered 'hot spots' for the disease which is present in the possum population – the possum is the main carrier of the disease in New Zealand.

Earlier this year calves from the Lindis Pass area were sold at an Omarama calf sale, and the vendor later advised the calves had reactors to TB.

There was a known problem in the Lindis area but Ospri were too slow communicating with farmers and failed to set up movement control early enough to cover the area. landowners claimed.

About 70 landowners and other affected parties met with Ospri representatives at the Ōmārama Hall in July to discuss the matter and ways to prevent the spread. A second meeting was held last month which 27 attended.

The primary reason for the second meeting was to discuss a review of the national control strategy.

But staff also fielded questions about the infected herd.

Once again the landowners expressed frustration with what they saw as a lack of communication on Ospri's part.

Although there was no legal obligation to let people know what had happened it was felt there was a moral obligation to do so especially to neighbouring properties, landowners said.

Not to do so only created panic, one farmer said.

Farmers wanted an assurance this would be remedied.

Ospri has also ramped up its TB testing for animals which have grazed in risk areas and which may have been in contact with infected herds.

It has also increased its wild animal control and survey programme for the 2025-26 year, including additional possum control.

Contractors have already begun the possum control programme, specifically around Clear Stream, Manuka Creek and the St Cuthbert Range, setting out Feratox in bait stations or bait bags, and using other ground control, and dogs and gun.

The work is scheduled to finish by June 30, 2026, when control efforts will be retendered.

In 2019 they bought a 45ft (13.8m) Catalina Morgan sloop in Fiji then two years later bought another boat in the US to complete what was to be a four-year sojourn. All up they spent the four years and Covid lockdowns exploring the Pacific including sailing down through Mexico, the Sea of Cortés, to El Salvador, then across the Pacific Ocean to French Polynesia, American Samoa, Fiji, New Caledonia, Australia, Indonesia, and finally Malaysia, where they came to a decision, sold the boat and returned to life on land.

"We were sitting on a beach in Malaysia and started thinking about what we wanted to do, what we wanted to be involved in. We knew that we wanted to be in New Zealand and to be our own bosses again. We looked at all sorts of businesses across the country. But we knew that, ultimately, grocery was what we wanted to get back into. To be honest, we always knew we would eventually come home to serve our community as local grocers again," Craig said.

Prior to heading out they had sold their On the Spot Collingwood business to embark on their sailing adventures.

The couple had not been to Ōmārama until they came to view the shop, Craig said. "We drove down to look at the store and community without any expectations. What we found blew us away really. The store has recently undergone a refit and looks fantastic and our first impression of the community was that it was exactly what we were looking for.

"We have the opinion that a store like this is not really owned by the operators, it's an asset that belongs to, and exists to serve the needs of, the community. We see our role as caretakers and guardians of that asset."

I've recently been in contact with the NZ Transport Agency who have assured me that they are working on painting yellow lines on the Omarama-Lindis Pass Rd near Shortcut Rd, where there is a sweeping corner and slight brow of a hill which hides part of the road from view. They've assured me that they are looking into it and have actually identified two sections in which yellow lines may be required.

Labour weekend in Otematata was good this year. The council had imposed the temporary liquor bans for Otematata township and Loch laird Rd and camp site. The main concern for me were a couple of holiday homes where it appears the parents have allowed their kids (and their mates) to use the property without any adequate supervision. It wasn't a big issue but I did receive a few noise complaints. On that Police are not noise control, nor are we dog control. If you need either please phone the council in the first instance. I'm happy to help but you need to phone them first.

That's it from me, stay safe. Bean.

Congratulations to Omarama Glider pilot and club instructor Tuulianna Laukkanen who was a Jonker Sailplanes challenge winner at the South African Nationals 2025 in Potchefstroom last month.

Earlier this year, Tuulianna was announced as the Jonker Challenge winner for juniors on WeGlide, sponsored by JS.

Her prize — an invitation to compete at the South African Nationals — gave her the chance to fly in what is said to be one of the most exciting soaring environments in the world. Tuulianna wrote this account for Jonker Sailplanes...

To her surprise she took to the cockpit on her very first day in South Africa. Her first flights were familiarisation flights in a Janus.

Over the following days, Tuulianna took part in the Nationals with an LS3, gaining valuable experience in South Africa's unique conditions.

The contest brought its share of challenges — from strong winds and unexpected landouts to discovering that the audio vario was set up incorrectly!

But each day offered new lessons, and her determination never faded.

While early contest days were affected by weather, the later stages brought excellent soaring conditions. Tuulianna enjoyed powerful thermals, impressive cloud streets, and speeds of over 100 km/h — flying just a few kmh slower than the day winner on one of the best racing days. One of the most memorable moments came on the final day, when she had the chance to fly the very first JS1 ever built in 18-metre configuration.

"It's a beautiful glider — I've always thought JS has the prettiest wings of any manufacturer," she said.

"The handling was amazing. I could just set it up in a thermal and take my hands away — perfect for taking pictures!"

The adventure concluded with an exclusive tour of the JS factory, where Tuulianna got to see how Jonker Sailplanes are designed and built.

"It was so fascinating to see the process behind these incredible aircraft," she said.

Last month members of the Otago Aero Club visited Omarama for a day of gliding. The visit was arranged by Malcolm Wright with the help of winch driver Felix Harper launch point controller, Karen Morgan, a ground crew of Phil Plane and Terry Jones. Malcolm and Tuulianna were the instructors and Charlie Irvin who manned the office Reports were the flying was superb and about 10 Otago power pilots were "all smiling at the end of the day." ## Waitaki District Council October news

## ICYMI Council meetings are recorded and can be found on its YouTube channel.

Yesterday, in its first meeting of the new term the council decided on appointments to positions and committees, and the adoption of the code of conduct and standing orders.

As well, it considered the October 21 letter from Local Government Minister Simon Watts about the appointment of former Minister Amy Adams as Crown Facilitator for water.

The council had some concerns primarily that the notification was given before it had a chance to meet and consider the letter. In its response it will indicate that it wishes to be a "guiding part of the solution".

The council wanted to provide the Department of Internal affairs with the information it needed quickly to reduce the costs of the Crown Facilitator on ratepayers, mayor Melanie Tavendale said in a statement.

The appointment of a facilitator was one of the options outlined by Local Government Secretary Paul James in his letter to the council on October 6 which rejected the council's original Water Services Delivery Plan.

The council was also told the Department of Internal Affairs assessment was that the Water Service Delivery Plan did not comply with the legislation and asked it to "reassess, amend and resubmit" the plan along with an asset review of the current condition, lifespan and value of the entire water services network and issues associated with that review – and to make amendments to the plan based on this.

Earlier this year the council voted against its initially preferred option of joining with Central Otago, Gore and Clutha district councils in the Southern Water Done Well group, and decided to go in-house to provide a water plan.

Elected members were sworn in at an inauguration ceremony at the Oamaru Opera House. Mrs Tavendale announced that Councillor Rebecca Ryan, who received the highest vote total for the Oamaru Ward, will be Deputy Mayor.

#### Chief executive's contract extended by 2 years

The newly elected council has confirmed a two-year extension to the current employment contract of chief executive Alex Parmley.

The agreement was reached before the elections, but not publicly announced until after voting concluded.

He has been set the tasks of completing work-in-process and delivering Government directed reforms.

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## Garden Diary - 'from where I stand'

November 1 and the wind stopped. Stillness.

The sun shone with warmth in its glow, finally.

The heaviest snowfall of the year had all but cleared leaving behind welcome moisture and no frost. You could almost hear garden sigh with relief as it gathered its dishevelled and tousled self to assess the damage and begin again. The budding peaches have made it through that test. There is the sound of chainsaws across the neighbourhood and the scent of freshly mown grass on the air.

Almost overnight there has been another change as the soft and pretty, butter wouldn't melt, pink, chartreuse and lemon colours fade from the garden and the vibrant and elegant jewel colours set into the emerald green of late spring take the stage. There is occasionally the hazy hint of a lazy summer's day... the gliders are whirling up and up above Black Peak.

Thoughts tumble over themselves, the 'to do' list is endless, overwhelming – happens this time every year. There is no time to "Le repose sous le lilas" as their heady scent drifts in the warm sunshine.

There are new plants to be unboxed and dug into their new home, river stones to be barrowed into place, weeds and yet more weeds.

So much to do it's easy to be distracted from the awesome transformation at my feet. As I hid from the spring storms the unsung heroes of the plant world - Gibberellins - have been hard at work.

These plant hormones work an amazing feat each year, waking up the plant and coaxing them into growth.

In just a few short months the annuals and perennials will have produced a growth spurt which would be the envy of most teenagers, sending shoots from ground level skywards anything up to metres high and into flower.

We hardly notice them hard at work.

It is the time to sow. Some have button tins, I have a seed basket - a treasury of little packages of hope. I sort and shuffle and stack but they contribute nothing while still gathering dust in the packet.

Some broad beans past their use-by by years did make it into the veggie garden in August and against the odds have each germinated. This year it has mostly been Mother Nature taking care of business.

The new house sits in the garden. No landscaping has been done yet but despite that

pushing through the rubble are irises, hellebores, peonies and poppies. I have no idea what colours, but their persistence is astonishing.

There's even broccoli.
