Trail accidents trigger Gazette inquiry

This is a long read – the story is in the detail

An official information request made to Fire and Emergency New Zealand shows it raised the alarm in March with Alps 2 Ocean Trail management about the state of Quailburn Rd after a series of callouts to cyclists suffering injuries – some serious – after they hit thick, loose shingle on the road.

However, the council has not released the record of that email correspondence in its response to the request for the same information made on the same date – June 13.

After payment of \$1402.50 the council agreed to supply information the Gazette requested provided a time extension was agreed. (The story about this is in the July Issue). It supplied some of that on August 16.

However, some of the information was only released yesterday afternoon (2.40pm, Tuesday, September 5) after the Gazette complained that questions had not been answered in full as required.

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Yesterday's information included a missing roading inspection report and one email – It was not one of the missing emails to Fenz – but one which refers to the roading report.

So, let's get down to the nitty gritty.

Cyclists meet Quailburn Rd as they come off Tarnbrae, the mountain trail and highest point of the A2O Trail on section 4 which travels from Ohau to Ōmārama.

It is noted on the trail website and brochure that a gravel road makes up 26% of the section 4 trail surface. Click through to the safety notes and there in the fine print among the other notes there is a warning the road can be corrugated with loose gravel, and to slow down because there have been “a number of accidents”.

Quailburn Rd has long been acknowledged as the second most dangerous section of the trail – the other being another shared gravel road – Hayman Rd in the Mackenzie District. It is why funds are being sought to take the trail off road in both these cases. This is becoming critical as record numbers of cyclists travel the trail. More on this later.

The A2O health and safety incident log was released by the council with the first batch of documents. In the log the council noted that despite frequent cycle accidents on Quailburn Rd its subsequent inspection found the road was “within spec”. The accidents were noted as being caused by “rider error” and logged as “not notifiable”.

In one month - March 2023 - there were nine reported cycle-related accidents noted in log as happening on section four. Trail management are not sure all incidents, especially more minor incidents, are being reported. Six of these were on Quailburn Rd from Woolshed corner where the trail meets the gravelled road to the tar sealed section. Two others were on the Tarnbrae trail and one happened outside HotTubs in Ōmārama. (Ambulances can only drive to the end of Quailburn Rd and may not go off-road, so cannot reach patients on the Tarnbrae portion of the trail. Search and Rescue are called to these cases. This lack of access can add significant delays to treatment.)

Of the six accidents in March on Quailburn Rd two were described as “major” but not notified. All cited hitting loose gravel and the accidents put down to “rider error”.

Each of these numbers is a person. As far as the Gazette is aware these people have had not had a chance to give their reasons for the accidents.

So, who knew what and when? [See Timeline overleaf for more detail]

“All incidents on the Trail are reported to the [A2O] Joint Committee in a health and safety report at each joint committee meeting,” a council spokesperson said.

“We do not hold in records to confirm the exact dates that the chairperson was informed of gravel issues.” The Joint Committee is co-chaired by Waitaki mayor Gary Kircher and Iwi representative Danual Cattermoul.

Last week, the Gazette spoke to long-time Quailburn Rd resident Hamish Smith, of Ben Dhu Station, about road conditions, maintenance and residents' safety concerns.

The road poses dangers to both vehicles and cyclists.

Residents had regularly voiced their concerns directly to the contractors and the council, he said.

Like other roads in the district Quailburn Rd was hit with washouts in last year's July-August flooding.

In September, as logged in the council's Health and Safety incident report, contractors made repairs and "metalled the road" and it was graded on March 6. Mr Smith understands from conversations he had with contractors and from his own experience that the shingle used to make the repairs was "not the right material". It has "no fines in it" and corrugates easily, he said. [*This was confirmed by the council roading inspection report - Ed*]

Fines are a fine dust mix which interlock the shingle and harden up the surface. In effect, shingle with no fines acts like marbles on the underlying road surface. Grading the material exacerbates the issue by spreading the shingle evenly over wheel tracks.

In deep gravel cycles try to stay in those wheel tracks, it is the only place they can ride, in wheel tracks cleared by previous vehicles. The gravel pushed to the sides is too deep.

"It's not the grader's fault. They're working with bog-shit material. It's shagged the road ... it's terrible to drive on," Mr Smith said.

Contractors had tried to remedy it by putting on material to mix in fines but "it's not really fixed the problem", he said.

As well, sometime during the maintenance process the camber on a critical corner was altered heightening the risk of a serious motor vehicle accident should someone come off the road at that point and hit the adjacent power pole, he said. In his time, he had not seen the road in such a state of disrepair.

Regardless, it was unsuited to cyclists, he said.

It was a public road used frequently by agricultural servicing businesses and he quite often came across cyclists riding five-abreast oblivious to the dangers.

"People think the whole thing is a cycle trail. At least 10 trucks a week go through there ... there's nowhere for the cyclists to go. It's not suitable for cyclists, it's bloody dangerous. They have been talking about how dangerous it is for a cycle trail ever since the trail was put in."

He believed the council should "take a lead" and take the trail off the road at least "where all the accidents happen at the gorge".

Last week, on a visit, the Gazette noted a new warning sign had gone up very recently. (*Photo overleaf*).

With the new tourist season fast approaching and several thousand cyclists expected to travel the trail again this season many are wondering what will be put in place to improve safety.

According to a source these questions were raised again by tour operators at an invitation-only A2O hui at Lakestone Lodge late last month. (Wednesday, August 23). That person also said they were told that neither the Mackenzie nor the Waitaki District councils were granted their request to MBIE for funding to take the trails off road at the two trouble spots- Hayman Rd and Quailburn Rd. However, the Mackenzie Council had agreed to start work on Hayman Rd regardless, the source said.

In an email in response to questions about this put to the A2O trail manager Robyn Hyde yesterday [Tuesday] Ms Hyde said;

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“Yes, unfortunately at 5.40pm last night I received email notification from MBIE that the Trail’s business case application for funding was unsuccessful.

“This disappointing news was shared with the Alps 2 Ocean Joint Committee, and several senior MDC and WDC staff this morning. As you can understand, I am incredibly disappointed by this outcome. Next steps will be for this matter to be discussed with the Joint Committee along with the two councils, to understand the ramifications of this decision on the safety and improvement plans for the Trail. The MBIE response cites insufficient funding available in the NZCT fund at this time as the key reason for declining our application. The costs of repairing a number of the Great Rides damaged by the North Island weather events has reduced the budget available for enhancements for the foreseeable future.”

Council asset operations manager Josh Rendell added the following comment:

“We are unable to provide any comment on when the Alps2Ocean cycle trail might be taken off Hayman Road and Quailburn Road as there is at this point in time, no funding to do so. Council is starting to prepare its next Long-Term Plan which details the capital work programme for the 10-year period from 2024/2025 - 2034/2035. Council will consult with the community on that plan early next year, seeking submissions on what projects and programmes should be included.”

Ms Hyde said Mr Kircher had assured her that “they will be lobbying all the political parties to get the NZCT fund increased”.

“In the meantime, I will continue to seek alternative funding sources and apply for grant funds through the support of the Friends of Alps 2 Ocean Charitable Trust.”

In a follow-up email to Ms Hyde the Gazette asked why, in that case, had the Mackenzie Council agreed to start work regardless. Here is the reply;

“Yes, to the best of my knowledge, MDC and the project team are moving forward to deliver as much of the Pukaki East project as possible. MDC have funds allocated for this project (as any funding from MBIE needs to be matched with local share funds) and it is a high priority to deliver. As the MBIE application has taken a year to come to a conclusion, the planning side of the Pukaki East project has continued noting the risk. The project team will be meeting again next week to re-evaluate and determine the next steps, but the intention is for this project to continue, and we will deliver as much as possible with what we have.

As stated earlier today however, the ultimate decision lies with the Joint Committee and the respective Councils.”

Back to the material that was missing from the council’s response to that first request for information.

To reiterate the council supplied some – not the missing Fenz emails - yesterday. It apologised for not including the roading inspection report and the roading officer’s email sent to the Trail Manager on March 21.

“We recognise and apologise that this report and email was not picked up on during our search for the information you requested. The incident information was provided in the Health and Safety incident’s log we provided however we missed providing you this email with the report.”

The new information provides some conflicting information.

The council was asked for:

“Any **letters** from members of the public, or from cycle tour operators received by or forwarded to Robin Hyde about the condition of trail surfaces of section 4 and section 5 of the A2O trail for September 1, 2022 to April 30, 2023.”

The reply;

*“Council apologises that we didn’t answer this as part of your initial request. We can confirm there have been **no letters** from the public or cycle tour operators received regarding the condition of the trail surfaces on section 4 or 5 of the Trail.”*

However, tour operators have made contact because their names are logged as having reported the incidents noted in the H&S log.

Plus members of the public noted serious concerns about hitting gravel unawares in the A2O survey responses [*See story overleaf*]

The council was asked;

“How many CRM’s (council jargon for officially logged complaints) have been raised this year about concerns about the safety issues for **cyclists** on the gravel section of Quailburn Rd? What date were these raised?”

The reply:

*“There are no records of CRMs relating to safety concerns for **A2O users** in relation to Quailburn Road for 2023.”*

But the accompanying roading inspection report notes a resident raised a CRM about the gravel and grading on March 9 – albeit not directly related to cycles – but not long after one of the “major” cycle accidents. [*See Timeline over*]

The Gazette also asked that, given the spate of incidents, what warnings were given to tour operators about conditions for cyclists on the gravel section of Quailburn Rd.

The council replied that the gravel section was already highlighted on the website and in the brochure with a photo of the road and safety notes.

“These resources are widely available to all trail users, including operators. Health and safety is a key topic when I am communicating with operators, and attendees at the recent A2O Hui were reminded again to use our website as a resource while briefing clients.

“It is important to remember that operators are also PCBUs, (person conducting a business or undertaking) and have a primary duty of care to ensure so far as reasonably practical the health and safety of their customers. This includes providing appropriate safety information to them.

“I would also like to mention that a gravel road is a dynamic environment and changes based on the use by a range of vehicles, from cars to large trucks and farm vehicles,” the council spokesperson said.

And the Gazette asked about the new sign – the only visible new safety measure installed since last season.

“The sign was put up on the 21st August 2023.” [Two days before the Hui]

“As part of our continuous improvement approach to Health and Safety, I regularly connect with FENZ and St John to look for improvement in our practices.

“Following a medical event on the Trail we met to look for ways to improve access and response times for Fenz attending events on the Tarnbrae section of the Trail.

As part of this meeting Fenz and St John mentioned that when they get a call to Quailburn Rd, it is nearly always as one location [The troublesome gravelled corner – Ed]. Together we looked at this location and identified that speed was a key contributor to incidents. We agreed that a sign warning cyclists at the top of the incline to slow down and manage their speed may prevent future accidents at this site. As this is a road, I met with XXXX from the roading team to develop a suitable

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sign and confirm the location. The sign was designed by roading and installed by the roading contractors.”

Information about this meeting was also missing from the council’s response to the Gazette’s original official information request.

The Gazette has asked for a copy of the New Zealand Cycle Trail audit conducted in January.

Timeline - March 2023 cycle accidents

TIMELINE: Quailburn Rd cycle incidents in March 2023 and actions taken – *created from information supplied by Fire and Emergency New Zealand, and the Waitaki District Council and in response to requests for official information.*

March 1

Major accident, Quailburn Rd, Head, neck and back injuries, cyclist fell off in gravel, transported by helicopter, reported by Escape by Cycle, *(noted in the A2O H&S incident log, possibly not notified as note in the log says it was “unclear as do not have full detail of injuries at time of incident”).*

March 2

Minor accident, Tarnbrae near woolshed, grazes, cyclists fell off in gravel, hit shingle and fell off, reported 16 June by Pure Trails. *(As noted in the A2O H&S incident log and noted as not notifiable).*

March 6

Road was graded. It was metalled in September 2022 *(noted in the A2O H&S incident log and the subsequent roading inspection report).*

March 7

Minor accident, Quailburn Rd, Upper arm injury, fell in gravel between Quailburn and Henburn Rd, reported by Sidetracks on June 13. *(As noted in the A2O H&S incident log and noted as not notifiable).*

March 9

Fire and Emergency New Zealand Waitaki District group manager Micheal Harrison first emails A2O trail manager Robyn Hyde about the "large amount of loose gravel". *(NB While this email was included in official information request response from Fenz it was not included in the WDC response.)*

Timeline - March 2023 cycle accidents

“Afternoon Robyn, On Wednesday the 1st of March, the Omarama First Responders attended an incident on Quailburn Road, Quailburn involving a (REDACTED) that fell off bicycle (REDACTED) cycling the Alps 2 Ocean trail when fell off bike due to loose gravel.

The information I've received from the Omarama Fire Brigade is that the section of Quailburn Road where the incident occurred has a large amount of loose gravel on the road that makes cycling difficult.

Ms Hyde responds later that day and asks for the exact location. *“I will get the roading team to have a look at the road.”*

On the same day a CRM was raised with the council by a Quailburn Rd resident querying the method of grading where gravel was shifted to the centre of the road (as noted in council roading inspection report).

March 12 at 11.46am

Major accident, Quailburn Rd, face and shoulder injuries, fell off in gravel. Cyclist riding long steady decline down Quailburn Road hit loose thick shingle (9-12 inches deep) on roadway causing front wheel to veer severely resulting in loss of control of bike and rider being thrown off. Reported by Fenz Omarama and Trail adventures. *(As noted in the A2O H&S incident log and noted as not notifiable).*

March 12 at 3.09 pm

In the emails supplied by Fenz but not the council there is this email chain which includes council major transport projects manager, whose name is also Michael Harrison, plus the council roading team.

Ms Hyde refers the email from Fenz's Mike Harrison about the incident on March 1 and the gravel issue to WDC's Michael Harrison and the roading team and asks them to investigate.

NB The incident referred to in this email thread is NOT the one which occurred that day but the incident on March 1.

There is this reply and response to Ms Hyde from the roading Network Infrastructure Engineer.

March 13

Ahuriri Community Board meeting discussion with Waitaki Mayor Gary Kircher as recorded in the minutes of the meeting p. 13

“The Mayor also briefed the meeting on discussions related to the A2O cycle trail that he had had with central government representatives in Wellington. There was an important role for Council to play in lobbying central government for more funding. There was brief discussion on ...the issues with Quailburn Road including that someone had come off their bike the previous day”.

Mr Kircher is joint chairperson of the A2O Trail Joint Committee

A council officer visits Quailburn Rd and a Roadroid - road roughness test - was done. *“RIR reading of 5.5 within spec. Visually okay with clear cycle tracks forming along the RH side of the road. No indication of excessive gravel on shoulders. No apparent issues between gravel road and sealed surface.”* (As noted in the A2O H&S incident log and the Roding Inspection report).

There is no indication of whether this is “in spec” for cyclists or other road users. (NB While this email was included in official information request response from Fenz it was not included in the WDC response).

March 14

Near miss, Quailburn Rd, deep metal where road transitions to tar seal causing a near miss, reported by Cycle Journeys. (As noted in the A2O H&S incident log and noted as not notifiable).

Also on **March 14** Ms Hyde emails Fenz about the roading inspection. (NB While this email was included in official information request response from Fenz it was not included in the WDC response).

Survey responses express concern

Survey responses obtained by the Ōmārama Gazette under an official information request show that while Alps 2 Ocean Trail users said the spectacular scenery more than matched expectations trail surface conditions and ratings prompted many to also raise concerns.

In May, in a press release, the Waitaki District Council reported the Alps 2 Ocean Cycle Trail had received the highest number of survey responses from Trail users compared to the other Great Rides.

“...the latest New Zealand Cycle Trail Monthly Report Survey received 807 responses from Alps 2 Ocean Cycle Trail users between April 2022 and March 2023,” it said.

Trail users who visit the website www.alps2ocean.com are encouraged to give feedback via a survey – managed by Get Smart survey solutions - and offered incentives to do so.

“The [survey] results exceed the benchmarked minimum and targeted feedback responses, which have been set at 300 and 500 respectively, meaning the sample can be considered representative and good for making robust, insightful analysis,” the press release said.

The Cycle Trail starts at the base of Aoraki Mt Cook in the National Park or alternatively at Takapō/Tekapo. The total number of trail users recorded for the whole trail not just sections 4 and 5 near Ōmārama were 78,224 for September 2022 to April 2023 with the peak at 16,045 in March 2023. There is no electronic counter on section 4 Ōhau to Ōmārama but Section 3 Twizel to Ōhau records a total for the season of 8597, peaking in March at 2026 users, and on section 5, Sailors Cutting to Benmore, at Rostriever 11,498 were recorded, peaking at 2316 in March.

“Positive feedback that has been received month-on-month is centred on praise for the scenery, facilities, and experiences offered by the Trail. The on-road gravel sections, trail surface and condition are cited as opportunities to improve the overall experience,” the press release said.

The survey also provided an analysis of the quarterly economic contribution made by visitors from activities and admission fees, accommodation, cafes, transport, and snacks and groceries purchased in the area

“The contribution per person per night over the last 12 months for the A2O was estimated at \$299.60, compared to an average for all trails per person per night of \$238.40.”

“February and March 2023 witnessed substantial growth of visitors compared to the previous year, with a percentage growth of 56% and 38% respectively.”

To get a broader picture from the survey results the Gazette asked the council for a copy of the responses which informed the press release and because not all of that was forthcoming a formal request under the Local Government Official Information and Meetings Act 1987 was necessary.

The Gazette was charged \$412.50 (\$165 per hour) specifically to extract the information from the survey database.

The Gazette asked for the “aggregated” and “anonymous” responses from September 1, 2022 to April 30, 2023 as collated by Get Smart system, and available to the Alps 2 Ocean Trail manager, to the questions about trail difficulty, condition of the trail surfaces, rating of trail signage, suggestions for improving the trail

experience, rating of information available on the Alps 2 Ocean website, and how many people needed to be rescued or evacuated.

The information requested June 13 was supplied August 16 with this comment; *"LGOIMA Q2 response is provided by NZCT Get Smart. Get Smart owns that information and have provided the statements below to be added.*

"The comments provided in LGOIMA Q2 response cannot be used as direct quotes or shared in the media/public environment. If comments were going to be shared publicly, Get Smart would need to have received express consent from the survey respondents to use their comments for this purpose. It is a one-sided view that only the comments in the "opportunities", section are required for this LGOIMA and not the "highlights/what people liked the most". Get Smart are very happy to verify directly to the requestor that the data provided is correct and complete, and if any help in interrupting (sic) any of the data is required, Get Smart would also be willing to help.

[No attribution was supplied – i.e who was it at Get Smart that said this? - Ed]

The Gazette asked for that specific information because it had not appeared in the press release which, understandably, gave primarily positive views.

(The question also arises –what more would the Gazette have had to pay to extract the "highlights/what people liked the most"?)

Overall, the survey responses supplied were what the survey said it was looking for – feedback, including constructive criticism aimed at improving the experiences for the next rider. Overwhelmingly, survey responders relished the experience and the camaraderie, even if at times it was more challenging than expected.

Suggestions for improvement confirmed what sources had told the Gazette (see *July 2023 story*).

In general, survey responders voiced concerns when their experience differed from the expectations formed from the information they had available and when there were no warnings about what to expect.

Here is a summary:

- Coming in for the most criticism; in the Waitaki District, was the trail surface on section four between Ōhau and Ōmārama, particularly the deep drifts of gravel encountered and the Hayman Rd section in the Mackenzie District.
- trail ratings underestimated the difficulty; some sections were not suited to recreational riders and differed from expectations. Respondents voiced concerns they were not prepared for what they were faced with and so could not make informed decisions about what bits of the trail they should tackle.
- Respondents found trail surfaces variable, poorly maintained and, in places they considered them dangerous.
- fuller briefings and more regular trail updates would have been helpful, as well as updates being posted on the A2O Facebook page in addition to the website.
- signage, particularly around washouts would have prevented people getting lost or having to navigate improvised detours.
- Shelters, more toilets, water stations, battery charger stations and more bike maintenance providers would have helped some. The state of the Department of Conservation toilet at the Quailburn Woolshed came in for serious censure.
- A suggestion was made that because those using the trail did boost local economies more money could be put into improvements.

Local heroes stage successful fundraiser

One of the organisers Christy Zeestraten said an "incredible amount" was raised which was enough to cover the salary of a teacher aid, support school skiing, camps and other extra circular activities for 2023.

School principal Alison Holden thanked everyone involved in organising the event. "It was a wonderful and very successful event and the school is most grateful for this support. A special thank you to Christy Zeestraten, Jo Golder, Kathy Kerr, Coralea McCabe, Petrina Paton and all the other people that contributed in some way. It was lovely to see the community coming together and just showed the investment that the Omarama community is willing to put into Omarama school for the benefit of our wonderful students," she said in the school newsletter.

Board of Trustees chairperson Jemma Gloag said she wanted to congratulate Friends of the School, on behalf of the board and the school community. MOU review - compromise reluctantly agreed

Those working to get a change made to the agreement between Fire and Emergency New Zealand and Hato Hone St John to allow a local agreement for the Omarama First Response unit have reached a compromise with the agencies involved – albeit reluctantly.

A year ago the Ōmārama Community gathered in force at a forum to press home to the two agencies that its community funded and volunteer-crewed First First response unit wanted to be called to all medical 111 calls to give assistance until an ambulance or other aid arrived because it was the closest help available.

The agencies left the meeting promising to consider the request as part of the review of their Memorandum of Understanding. The agreement is still under review.

Last month, Fenz personnel involved met with members of the Ōmārama Co-Response Trust via a video link to discuss ongoing emergency care for the people of Ōmārama. No St John Personnel were present.

In a follow-up meeting of the Trust it reluctantly agreed to the proposal put to them by Fenz – that is, in effect, the MOU would remain not materially different to the original agreement.

However, the two agencies have agreed to a “closer working relationship” with Ōmārama's First Response and to “ensure emergency call outs are well considered”.

Yesterday, (Tuesday) Fenz and St John both issued statements.

Fenz said it had found the meeting with the Trust to be to be “a positive, supportive discussion”.

“We acknowledge the Trust’s agreement to work with what has now been decided by Hato Hone St John.

“This will mean the Ōmārama Volunteer Fire Brigade will respond to medical emergencies according to the current National Memorandum of Understanding with Hato Hone St John, and as requested by Hato Hone St John despatchers.

“Hato Hone St John agrees it will also work with Fire and Emergency on a process to ensure emergency call outs are well considered.

“We support this approach and are confident there will be a closer working relationship with all parties in future,” the Fenz statement said.

St John said it was grateful to the Ōmārama Co-Response Trust, the Ōmārama Fire First Response Unit, PRIME and rural General Practice colleagues, along with the wider community for their ongoing interest and support in providing emergency care to residents and visitors in the area.

It wanted to acknowledge dedicated volunteer fire brigades, including Omarama, that had been trained to ‘First Responder level’, allowing them to respond to actual or potential life-threatening emergencies in their communities.

“While the Trust’s request for FFRU to be deployed to all 111 calls in their area is not supported, Hato Hone St John is developing a process to ensure any request for an FFRU is well considered, especially for vulnerable patients (such as elderly who have fallen) and patients who may be exposed to environmental factors that make them prone to deterioration prior to ambulance arrival,” the St John statement said.

Omarama Co-response Trust chairperson Lindsay Purvis said he had acknowledged

receipt of the joint statement and decision.

“While it is not exactly the result that we put so much hard work into trying to achieve, Hato Hone St John were very strong in delivering the message via Fenz that they would not entertain the idea of continuing with the enhancement of the Memorandum of Understanding that we have had over recent years.

“While the exact reason for this decision remains a mystery to me, for the sake of future governance of our Trust and Fire Brigade it was decided that we must accept their ruling but continue to monitor the calls that we do and don't receive.

“If you are unfortunate enough to be in a position of having to make a 111 call please do not understate the conditions, both medical and climatic that either you or your patient are in.

“The answers you give to questions asked by the dispatcher will determine the amount of support you will receive.

St John's ruling made it unique as far as he was concerned.

“In so far as in this modern time it is almost impossible to find an agency that will push back on something that is being offered with no gratuity involved.

“Following on from our public forum of last August there has been an incredible amount of work involved in trying to resolve this matter and I would like to thank those individuals responsible.

“It has been an unsettling time for our Trust and I think we all look forward to putting this behind us and getting on with the job of supporting our first responders while they deliver such an amazing amount of commitment to the care of our community,” Mr Purvis said.

The Ōmārama Gazette has been advised that the community's petition to Parliament asking for change is still being considered by the Petitions Committee.

Although, this Parliament has been dissolved ahead of the elections next month, the petition would “very likely be picked up again” in the next Parliament by the new Petitions Committee. That's likely to be in October or November, the spokesperson said.

“We will get in touch with the petitioner as needed in the new Parliament.”



Contractors on target

Ōmārama's new water treatment plant looks to be on schedule for its completion date in December, the Waitaki District Council says.

"Work has ramped up in recent weeks and all going well, things are looking good for scheduled completion in mid-December," senior projects manager Gareth Phillips said.

"While the weather has been a challenge for our contractors at times, with some very cold overnight temperatures, they are making excellent progress."

The new plant and supporting infrastructure has been designed to supply water that meets the New Zealand Drinking Water Standards and caters for future growth. It will withstand severe earthquakes and the final design would also be sympathetic to the surrounding area, he said.

Three of the water bores have had new pumps installed – as well as pump risers, meters and other equipment.

In late 2021, the council bought the block of land at a cost of \$235,000.

It sits outside the flood prone area, adjacent to the old treatment plant site.

It also agreed to move its transformer from the original site to the new site at an estimate cost of \$50,000.

As part of the development neighbouring trees which the council says could pose a health and safety risk or a risk to underground services (electrical and pipework) will be removed at an estimated cost of \$18,700.

In April 2022, council officers asked the council for an additional amount of \$1.62 million for the upgrade project, meaning a revised total project cost estimate of around \$3 million.

The initial cost of \$1.4m for the upgrade was covered by the first tranche of Three Waters Reform funding (now known as the Affordable Waters Reform) which was announced in 2021.

The increased project costs will be loan-funded with the balance transferred to the new Affordable Waters entity, and future pricing/funding models were yet to be determined," Mr Phillips said.

Included in the building plans is a \$200,000 fluoride treatment room in anticipation of central government requirements.

However, the water would not be fluoridated unless there was a government requirement to do so.

"This is preparation in case this becomes a requirement," Mr Phillips said.

During the excavation process excess soil was shifted to the council-owned reserve land leased by Ōmārama Top 10 Holiday Park to form bunds to help prevent future flooding.

The contractors working on the site are; Corde - who is responsible for the building and pipe construction, Plunket Electrical, WaterForce and Filtec - water treatment equipment design and installation, specialists.

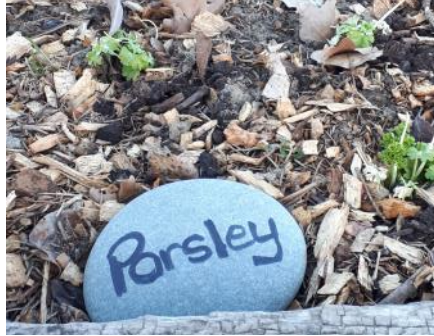

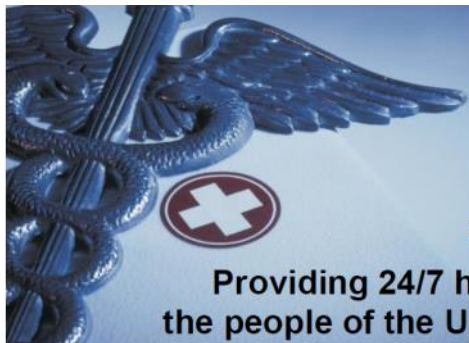

Wellness matters

As the colours of spring start to paint the world around us and the weather warms up, it is also a good time to think about our health.

Breathe easy this spring!

Respiratory tract infections continue to affect people of all ages in our community. Here are some tips for staying and getting well.

Breathe clean air! Quit smoking and avoid exposure to environmental pollutions, being mindful that some indoor chemicals can also irritate our lungs.

Help support lung health by staying hydrated, exercising, and eating foods rich in antioxidants, vitamins and omega-3 fatty acids like berries, citrus, leafy greens and fish.

If you are prone to allergies, developing a self-management plan is a good idea, as usually early intervention can minimise progression of allergy symptoms.

Vaccines are an important defence against illness. Find out more about the range of vaccines available at www.immunise.health.nz.

Antibiotics are for bacterial infections and can't fix a virus like a cold or flu, so if you do get sick with a virus, self-care measures are recommended. Contact your healthcare provider for advice if needed.

Cervical Cancer

September is cervical screening awareness month and from the 12th of the month, the primary test for cervical screening will change to a human papillomavirus (HPV) test, with the option of self-testing.

If you are between 25 and 69 and have ever been sexually active, screening should be every five years unless advised otherwise. This can detect abnormal changes in the cells of the cervix caused by HPV. Left untreated these can develop into cervical cancer over time.

Together, the HPV vaccine and test are your best protection against cervical cancer. Anyone under the age of 27 can receive the HPV vaccine for free. For more info call 0800 729 729 or check out www.timetoscreen.nz/cervical-screening.

Prostate Cancer

September is prostate cancer awareness month; the most diagnosed cancer in men. Early detection can save lives and there may be no warning signs. The most common sign is problems with urination. If you have unusual symptoms like this, is important to see your doctor. This can happen as men get older and can be due to prostate enlargement, not cancer.

If you are between 40 and 50 with a close family member affected by prostate cancer (e.g., father or brother) you should be tested.

It is recommended that men learn about the benefits and harms of testing and treatment and what they might mean. You can ask your doctor about this or use a helpful decision-making tool at www.kupe.net.nz and check out Blue September at www.prostate.org.nz.
