Farewell, Georgie Girl

It would be impossible to know just how many lives she touched In fact, many of those she helped would have not even known her name.

Ōmārama's Georgie Robertson died in Christchurch on March 8.

Her death was announced by her family with this simple statement; "A life well lived, Georgie was devoted to helping others and will be deeply missed by many."

Georgie with husband Tim and the family began holidaying in Ōmārama in 2003 and moved to the town permanently in 2009.

She joined the Ōmārama Volunteer Fire Brigade as a first responder in 2012. It was for this work she was probably most widely known.

And despite the debilitations cruelly imposed by the illness she fought, and which she resented as a total inconvenience, she never resigned from the brigade, playing her part until the last.

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A tribute to Georgie Robertson, continued

In his final role as Ōmārama's chief fire officer Greg Harper paid tribute to his longstanding friend and colleague.

"Georgie will be sadly missed by all at the Ōmārama Volunteer Fire Brigade.

"I would describe Georgie as one the most positive people I have known. She was also respectful to everybody and judged nobody.

"She was reliable and always keen to be part of any activities at brigade training and socially.

"Georgie kept up with our calls and was still giving valuable input right up till the last couple of weeks."

Senior first responder and close colleague Geva Innes said she was honoured to write this in honour of and in farewell to Georgie.

"Georgie wore many hats in this district.

"She battled continuously and successfully to achieve recognition and training that the First Responders required and deserved. A wonderful friend and work mate."

Georgie was there throughout major events which the volunteers faced and which were undisputedly life changing for all involved.

When she recounted the Lake Ōhau fire and those acts of bravery she recalled, with tears, how she and the team which had remained back at base had listened to the comms in utter fear as reality dawned, believing all those at the front could die. In the event not one life was lost.

And she pushed that fear into practical action helping 'man' the evacuation centre, offering reassurance and comfort.

She was there again in the early hours in the July 2022 floods first helping with the evacuation of residents then 'manning' the evacuation centre.

It was all hands-on deck that night and once again she recounted the unvoiced fears when that night played out, and the just sheer exhausting physicality of the job the volunteers faced when the Ōmārama Stream broke out of its channel. She well and truly earned her stripes.

So, let's not sugar coat this.

She had stinging words for those who stood in the way of what she thought was best for her beloved community and, as her friends have said, she did not suffer fools. She defied the ruling from above that said she should not respond to those who called her personal phone and asked for help but should have them make the 111 call, 'put the siren up" and wait for the formal response. While she respected the reasoning she said she could never turn anyone away.

Although her fire brigade family held a special place in her heart, she embraced any opportunity to help others with enthusiasm.

When Covid 19 hit the town bringing with it all its uncertainty she was again on the front line, helping lead the community care response with arranging meals and care packages for those isolating despite her own vulnerability.

She may not have ever said the words but all knew she stood for equality, inclusivity and natural justice.

Georgie was inducted as a Justice of the Peace in February 2016. Cate Bole was the North Otago JPs' registrar at the time.

She remembers a "very approachable, effective and capable Justice of the Peace" who she knows will be missed by the community.

Dedicated to the role she travelled to Oamaru for training and education evenings, taking part by via Zoom in recent times. She also travelled to Dunedin to take part in Issuing Officer training which she qualified for in September 2018. " – all of this to understand the seriousness and legality of the voluntary, sometimes time-consuming position.

"She was very interested, loyal and committed to her district's people... Our sympathy goes to her family."

Georgie was one of the founding library volunteers when the Community Centre library was formed. Friend and fellow library volunteer Glenys Dawson said Georgie was the first to put her hand up when a job needed done.

"She just got on with things with her no-nonsense approach.

"Georgie was hugely appreciated by us all, and the wider Waitaki District Library community....our thanks go out for all the time she gave"

Pam Young, a member of the former Ōmārama Business Group, said it was well aware how fortunate it was to have Georgie's computer expertise, willingness and enthusiasm to develop the Discover Ōmārama webpage - "putting Ōmārama on the world stage in technology". And to take chances on new ideas.

"It is said; 'Life is not measured by the number of breaths we take, but by the moments that take our breath away. You my dear friend have been an inspiration to us all in making Moments Happen. Rest easy."

Georgie worked for Glide Ōmārama from 2013 to 2018. Owner Gavin Wills says she was a highly skilled computer whizz... "wonderful with clients and fellow staff, she was a mediator, wise, calm under pressure, whose positive cheerful spirit enlivened all".

More than anything Georgie loved to fly, he said.

"On any excuse she was off on a gliding adventure; further, longer or higher was better! My last flight with Georgie, we flew four hours down the Maniototo, then west past Cromwell into the remote Branches Station. In the lee of Mount Aspiring we climbed to 5000m and flew home in the sunset via Mount Cook. That was the kind of flight she loved."

"She's greatly missed by all her gliding family."

Former Ōmārama Gliding Club chief flying instructor Gavin Wrigley said Georgie's enthusiasm and energy for the Ōmārama community never waned.

"Her love of flying and her ongoing enthusiasm about the 'new look' Ōmārama Gliding Club and the wellbeing of her flying friends continued to the end. "She was really pleased that the OGC open day could be supported by the Simon Gault event, and her final flight with Milan [Kmetovics] meant a great deal to her. She did not think that it was going to be possible. We will always be grateful for having had the lovely Georgie in our midst." he said.

Her final gift to her community and in particular to the recently-formed MenzShed was to stage the Simon Gault Event in November.

To her absolute delight not only was the event declared a success, brought all parts of our community together and managed to raise a little money to give back, also everybody had fun!

Simon has sent this message to be shared with the Ōmārama community. "I'm so incredibly sorry to hear that Georgie has passed. She was such a special person, and I know how much she meant to the community.

I feel truly grateful to have been able to visit her for the MenzShed, and it means a lot to hear that it lifted her spirits. She was an amazing woman, full of kindness and strength, and she will be deeply missed.

"Please pass on my condolences to Tim".

Most of all our hearts go out to Tim, Georgie's husband of 44 years, to her "girls" and their partners; Bridget and Simon, Gemma and Jeremy, Justine and Dan, and to her beloved grandchildren Rosie, Emma, Abby, Fergus, Max and Francis.

Our sincerest condolences and love to you all. Thank you for sharing Georgie with us.



Chief and 'chiefette' take a step back

The 'Chief' and 'Chiefette' maybe taking a step back. But for Team Harper the Ōmārama Volunteer Fire Brigade family will still be a key part of their lives.

This week Greg Harper stood down from the role of chief fire officer and Ōmārama Deputy Chief fire officer Jack Zorab has been appointed to the role.

It was "Ōmārama's worst kept secret," Greg said.

When he took on the role he had intended five years would be his limit, he said, and it had been almost six since he stepped up to fill the vacancy left by Terry Walsh.

It had been a momentous few years punctuated as it was by 2020.

That year saw the beginning of the Covid 19 crises, and two of New Zealand's largest wildfires – The Lake Pukaki fire in August and the Lake Ohau fire in September. "They were really big calls."

His lasting memories will be "how the team pulled together".

"Covid was the worst time"

There was such uncertainty.

"[There was] stuff thrown at us all the time...it was so fluid. That was one of the toughest things."

Coincidentally, in 2020, and sneaking in just prior to the first Covid lockdown, there was another major event. The Ōmārama Brigade staged the 50th Wajax

competitions, drawing brigades from throughout the south to celebrate the jubilee of the first unofficial Wajax pump competition, in 1970 between rural brigades in Stewart Island and Glenorchy and Ōmārama.

A significant highlight and one he had found most rewarding was serving alongside and acknowledging the achievements of brigade stalwarts.

Being there to oversee operational support volunteer the late Denise Tamati awarded a life membership, the life memberships and service medals given to Geva Innes in 2023 and Liz Komen in 2024 were highlights.

Nowadays Fire and Emergency New Zealand was instructing brigades to encourage diversity and equality within its ranks. In this aspect, he was proud to say the Ōmārama Brigade had led from the front, Greg said.

The equipment provided had improved during his tenure. The brigade was on to its third truck and was recently given a new tanker.

A regular challenge was the turnover of volunteers often only completing a relatively short stint before they left town.

Nonetheless, it was a "good team:" with those from outside the area making positive remarks about how professional it was.

On a more personal note, Greg achieved his gold star – 25 years' service - in 2022, and last year he became Otago Southland Provincial Fire Brigade Association president – made all the more poignant, he said, because the conference where he was sworn in was held in Ōmārama. Greg stands down from this position in May. Being involved with the United Fire Brigades' Association including the various fire fighter challenges for the past 15 years had taken him from Whangarei to Stewart Island and he had made life-long friends.

"There's a lot of communication done at those events."

There had been significant changes within the Fenz organisation and a move to more centralisation and uniformity of regulations.

Plus, there was now a much more positive working relationship with St John thanks



to the improvement in the Memorandum of Understanding.

"We have a great relationship with our St John team."

Medical calls have always made up a high proportion of the brigades work. Last year 46 of the 129 calls the brigade attended were medical calls.

"There's been the tough stuff too." – the hard calls, the life changing events."

Greg is quick to acknowledge he has not held the role on his own, with wife Adrienne – the 'Cheifette' - at his side as "a sounding board".

Greg will continue to volunteer for the Omarama the brigade as senior fire fighter "I've got a few to annoy yet."

"As I say we have to keep heading toward the future. The future is in front of us not back in the past."

New fire chief Jack was appointed deputy fire chief less than six months ago but was more than capable of filling the role, Greg said.

"The brigade will be in good hands with a new management team going forwards." And he was looking ahead to the next appointment – that of possibly Omārama's first woman deputy fire chief.

Fly-in ends with tragedy

Police have confirmed one person died and another was critically injured following the light plane crash in the Dingleburn Valley on Saturday.

The plane which crashed near Lake Hawea was taking part in the Aircraft Owners and Pilots Association (AOPA) Autumn fly-in.

Former Gore man Ivan Van de Water, who had retired to Wanaka, has been named as the person who died in the crash and friend Don Grant was cut from the wreckage of the plane and flown to Dunedin Hospital in a critical condition.

Maritime New Zealand's Rescue Coordination Centre was alerted to the crash and Lake Tekapo and Ōmārama emergency services were called about 1:30pm, and firefighters were flown into the scene.

In a post on the Lake Tekapo Fire Brigade Facebook page it said Tekapo volunteers were "deployed in support of Ōmārama Fire Brigade".

"Tekapo have flyable cutting gear and flew with MacKenzie Helicopters".

Police will make inquiries on behalf of both the Civil Aviation Authority and the Coroner to determine the cause of the crash.

AOPA told Radio New Zealand its members were "deeply upset" over the fatal crash and would help the authorities in any way requested to determine its cause.

About 33 planes and one helicopter, took part in its Autumn fly-in at the Omarama Airfield.

On Saturday, after the mandatory briefing and once the fog lifted the 70 visitors headed off in four groups to explore the Upper Waitaki, Maniototo and Mackenzie Country in clear skies.

Those taking part in the fly-in event travelled from as far away as the North Island and "deep Southland", the West Coast, Canterbury and Otago.

The group used Discovery Countrytime Hotel Ōmārama as its base.

Operation Dragon update - the numbers are in

Police have released the numbers of infringement notices and warning handed out to motorists stopped during Operation Dragon at Waitangi Weekend.

Road policing teams together with the NZTA regulatory staff stationed themselves in and around Omārama for about four days from February 1 as part of the wider Operation Dragon exercise which ran from January 29 to February 9.

Last month, figures provided to the Omarama Gazette showed 473 were stopped at road police checkpoints on SH8 and Ōmārama Ave.

In response to an Official Information request National Road Policing director Superintendent Steve Greally said during that time police issued 147 infringement offence notices and 14 written traffic warnings in and around Omarama.

It was reported earlier to the Otago Daily Times that across the Central Otago and Queenstown Lakes to Milford Sound area in those 12 days 260 infringement notices were issued.

Overall, motorists were pulled up on excessive speed, not wearing seatbelts, use of cell phones, and overtaking with insufficient room or on no-passing lines, police said at that time.

NZTA began the process of taking over all safety camera enforcement from the police in July .

However, last month it told the Omarama Gazette it had no plans to install a permanent safety camera in Omarama. In the initial part of its plan it will add 27 new cameras. Overall, there will be 51 new cameras, it said.

"Although we're not considering this location for a new safety camera, we will work with NZ Police on enforcing speeds here," the NZTA spokesperson said.

This could be via the future operation of a NZTA operated mobile safety camera or via NZ Police operating a speed radar."

As part of Operation Dragon members of the police commercial vehicle safety team and NZTA regulatory officers focused on unlicensed tourist operators around Te Anau and Omarama.

As a result, four unlicensed tourism operators were found and follow up investigations initiated.

Celebrating a powerful achievement - continued

Here are the **facts** about why this project was initiated:

*The Omarama Emergency Management Group (Fenz, SAR volunteers and Omarama Police) - decided, in the case of disaster, a 40KVA generator is required to run the Community Centre, hall and kitchen.

*The Centre is the nominated community shelter in case of an emergency. As such it will be a communication hub. The medical clinic can be used to treat those injured. The Centre is owned by the Residents' Association of Ōmārama.

*The generator will also be used to provide power to the Omarama MenzShed facility adjacent to the Centre. In return MenzShed will maintain and service the generator. *Because of Ōmārama's location it is considered highly likely that during a disaster - the Alpine Fault rupture, flooding or snow, the township may be cut off from help for some days, if not weeks. Should power be cut it could be some time before this could be restored. The concern is during winter months people could be at risk with not having warm shelter. Along with warmth, there is a need for cooking facilities to heat and refrigerate food to cater for a large number for a length of time.

*Electrician Brent Fokkens carried out the initial assessment of the size of generator needed to run the community centre, which includes heating, lighting and the kitchen, as well as medical centre. He recommended a 40KVA diesel generator.

* For it to be used by Ōmārama MenzShed and for other community projects it needs to be portable – on a trailer. Being transportable also makes it easier to service and refuel. * There is no generator in Ōmārama with the capacity to run the necessary facilities at the Ōmārama Community Centre in an emergency.

* The Fire Brigade generator is not owned by Omārama Fire Brigade and can be requisitioned for use anywhere in the district.

* The Ōmārama Search and Rescue generator does not have the capacity.

* Other large generators in the district are privately-owned, mostly by dairy farmers. In case of an emergency these would be used on the farm because farmers are legally required to continue to operate to prevent animal welfare issues.

*Although in a disaster an emergency generator could be helicoptered into the areas isolated by a disaster event, there is no agreement in place for this to happen in a timely manner. The availability of a large capacity generator cannot be guaranteed and would require a heavy lift helicopter. Also, in the initial stages of a disaster helicopters would be busy dealing to medical emergencies and emergency assessment activities.

* The Ōmārāma Community has always prided itself on being self-reliant when outside help is not immediately available.

* The Ōmārama MenzShed is a relatively new group of volunteers which is already benefitting the wider community, specifically through completion of projects at the school, the community gardens, at the Community Centre, and Rodeo club, and for the elderly. These would otherwise prove too costly or difficult to achieve.

* They have a strong core group of members and are actively encouraging new members of all ages from throughout the region to join.

* They have basic facilities which are gradually being enhanced as funds and time allows. There has been a generous donation of tools.

* The lack of a power source is hampering their attempts to grow and to tackle a wider range of projects.

* In return for the use of the generator - their contribution will be to service and maintain the equipment to keep it in working order at all times – this includes keeping the generator fuelled and the trailer roadworthy – a not inconsiderable commitment



A letter has been sent to Berry & Co, the lawyers representing us in the St Thomas Church claim requesting that they write on our behalf to contend the equitably of the distributed funds from the sale of St Thomas Church. It is the Residents Association belief the land and building sale price should be included in the 50% equation because the community donated the land and materials to build the church.

This week I have had communication from Cyndi Christensen re: The Better Off funding application. The WDC are requiring a lot more information regarding the irrigation project. They would like to see a project manager appointed,

A written project masterplan with timelines for the whole proposed project including costings (not just the irrigation stage),

Alignment with any fiscal impact of the whole project on any future proposed development in the town – (Ōmārama Design Plan - Baxter Draft Masterplan 2020).

WDC and ECan consents would need applied for, approved and paid before any work could start. It was suggested that we could use BOF to pay for consents then raise funds for the balance of the project. I was assured the BOF money was still available to the Ōmārama Community to spend, approximately \$60,000.

OGC Captains Log ~ March, 2025

Autumn flying is great!

This season still has a few weeks left in it yet! There is plenty of time for some thermal or wave flights before the winter paints our mountains white. We are lucky to have commercial gliding operators at Ōmārama. A tow plane is often available when they are launching. Be sure to turn up for the 10am briefing for more info. There are some great chances to launch using the winch over the next few weeks too. 5th, 6th April ~ Otago University Gliding Club Weekend. 18th to 21st April ~ Youth Glide Easter Weekend. Roger Read tells me everyone is welcome to join in, help out, launch and fly these weekends!

A great wave day in Ōmārama ~ 2nd March 2025: Some days just pump! You know it is going to be a great day when the morning briefing is busy! Milan mentioned the word 'wave' during the weather briefing and the excitement was building. An early start was declared with both winch and aerotow available. The OGC had just mobilized its full launch ability, and we all happily scrambled! The winch was already launching Youth Glide students skyward 2000' above the ground and showing us that the thermals had indeed started. I decided to give KJ a winch day. ~ 15 winch launches were made Bradan ND, Kelvyn OK, Angus GQ, Justin DMCC, Keith and Hannariina OD, Bradan ND, Aaron ZX, Griz MT, John ZS, Bradan OR, Rod KJ, Malcolm YT, Angus GQ, Terry and Karen TF, Rod KJ. ~ three Aerotows were made by Milan DD, Roger VT, Warren ZC. Everyone got away and the lift was smooth and plentiful. Thermals and ridge lift to 7000' and wave after that.



Gliding can be a punishing mistress. I bombed like a shot duck on my first launch. After just nine minutes in the air, I landed but was soon hooked on again and ready for more punishment! Second flight, I released straight into a thermal, climbed to 4000' and flew onto Mt St Cuthbert. My flight lasted for 2hrs and 45mins, I climbed to 13,300' in wave and completed a 143km cross country. Special thanks to Angus who gently coerced me into a stunning wave straight above Ōmārama. The highest I have been solo and my first time on oxygen in KJ. What a feeling! Ya-hoo-be-doo-be-doo! Check out my rather amateur YouTube video taken in wave at 13,000'

Congratulations to Tuulianna Laukkanen on becoming the OGC's newest instructor at age 18! Gavin Wrigley and Ian Willows completed her training and our CFI Milan Kmetovics signed her off . Tuulianna hopes to teach her first students at the Otago University Gliding Club weekend April 5 and 6. Superb effort!
